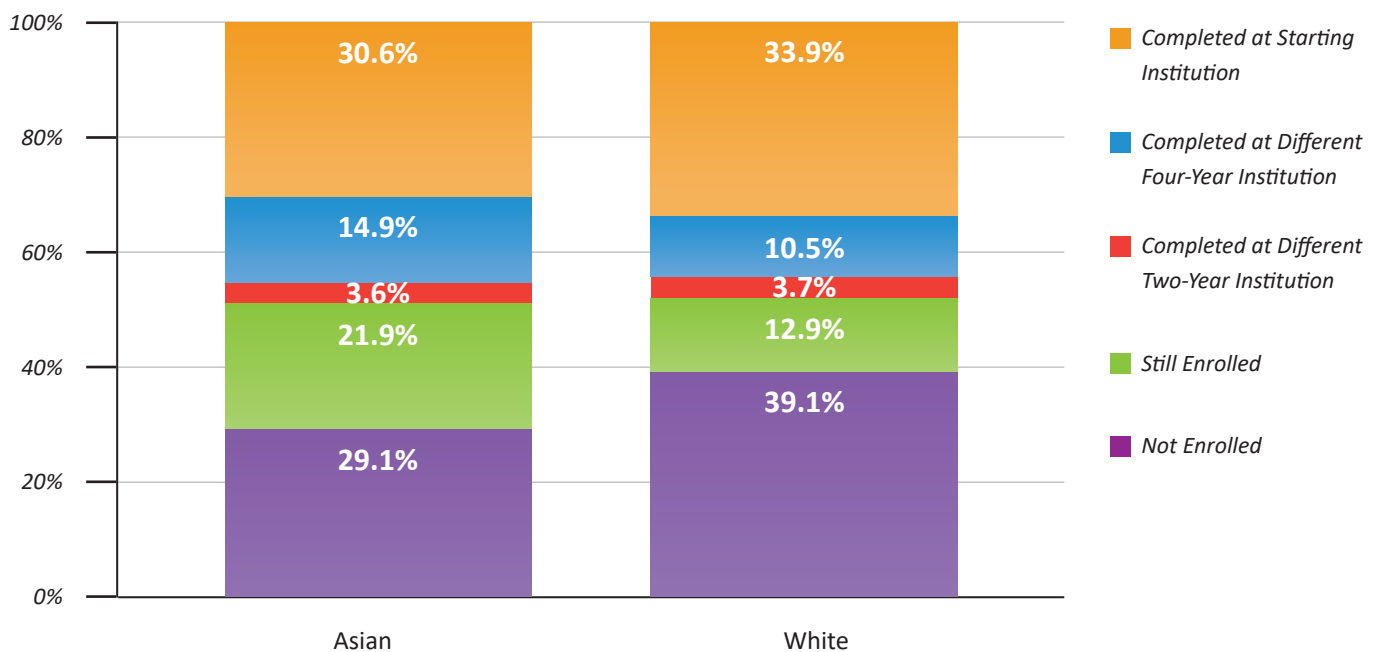


Outcomes for Asian students

Nearly half of Asian students who started at public two-year institutions in 2012 completed college within six years.

Data recently released by the National Student Clearinghouse Research Center highlight completion and persistence patterns for different racial and ethnic groups. Asian students who started at public two-year institutions have higher persistence and completion rates than any other race-ethnicity group. Asian students who started at community colleges in fall 2012 had a 49.1 percent college completion rate (either at the community college where they started or another college) within six years. Another 22 percent of the same cohort were still enrolled in college, and about 30 percent had left college without earning a credential.

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
