

We host the National Summit on Education to annually convene education policymakers, shapers and leaders, and we facilitate networks of states and partner collaboratives to inform policy and practice.







STRATEGIES FOR RELIEF FUNDS



Parent demand for education options is higher than ever. But fewer than 1 percent of the nation's 50.8 million K-12 students have access to a private choice program. And for families seeking public options, more than 1 million students remain on waitlists for access to a charter school. With proven benefits ranging from increased college attendance and taxpayer savings to academic improvement, ExcelinEd is working to expand educational options for all students.

RESOURCE HIGHLIGHT

Index Tool for Meeting Charter School Facility Needs

ExcelinEd developed a calculation tool that assesses the extent to which a state is meeting the facility needs of its charter schools. The Indiana Charter Coalition used the support an increase in charter per-pupil funding. In Ohio, facilities funding was doubled, from \$250 to \$500 per student, to meet an additional 11.2% of facility needs for Ohio's 322 community schools.

Expanding ExcelinEd's ESA Administrator Network

Now in its second year, ExcelinEd's first-of-its-kind ESA Administrator Network doubled the number of states participating in Network convenings. Fourteen states joined for one or more of the Network's five virtual meetings plus the in-person event at the 2021 National Summit.

The Network supports administrators from states with Education Scholarship Account (ESA) programs to share knowledge and resources for sound administrative practices, national and state-specific solutions, professional development and the policies, hallmarks and supports needed for successful ESA program implementation.





STATE ADVOCACY HIGHLIGHTS



Schools and educators must put students at the center of learning, tailoring experiences to meet the unique strengths, interests and needs of individuals. Innovative strategies include flexible paths to academic mastery, credit for work experience and allowing students to learn anywhere. From delivery and pace to place and path, alternative learning models have become a necessity for a high-functioning, 21st-century education system.



Flexibility Guides for Alternative Learning Models

ExcelinEd continued to build on the success of its flexibility guides, adding state-specific guides for Michigan and South Carolina. The guides provide school districts and leaders with customized information to advance student-centered learning through their state's education regulations and a look at the suite of learning models available to schools as they seek to reimagine education



THOUGHT LEADERSHIP HIGHLIGHTS

Network of State Innovation Partners

Each year, ExcelinEd convenes education leaders from more than a dozen states to advance innovations and flexibilities and to identify actionable strategies that support more personalized, student-centered learning models. Three convenings in 2021 drew 22 participants from 14 states and 3 partner organizations. Agenda topics included a state legislative summary of progress and a focus on how to help educators stabilize, recover and advance toward more student-centered learning models.

#EIE21 — Education Unbundled: A New Education System for All Learners

Panelists identified what barriers exist today and what policy conditions can unbundle the system to customize learning.



Several states made notable progress in reimagining learning through expanded flexibility for districts, schools and individual students.

South Carolina created schools of innovation to support student-centered learning, and Arizona provided flexibility to its public schools to use innovative learning models. Nevada established seat-time flexibility, while Utah and Indiana expanded course access for students, with Utah also extending virtual course offerings to middle schools.



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Bridge the Digital Divide

ENSURING EVERY STUDENT HAS EQUITABLE ACCESS TO THE DIGITAL SUPERHIGHWAY

Bridging the digital divide is a pivotal step in ensuring all students have equitable access to a quality education. Prior to the pandemic, data from the National Center for Education Statistics and USAFacts showed that 14 percent of schoolchildren had no internet access at home, and 17 percent lived in households without a computer. As policymakers and practitioners help students recover from lost learning, they know that learning will occur both inside and outside of the traditional classroom setting. All students urgently need basic devices and access to the Internet in order to continue learning.

RESOURCE HIGHLIGHT

ExcelinEd published a set of policy resources to support state leaders in bridging the digital divide, including Achieving K-12 Broadband Goals Using a State Request for Information Process with steps for states to efficiently aggregate the broadband marketplace and more equitably provide connectivity and devices to lowincome households.

ExcelinEd's model policy, the <u>Digital Devices for All</u>
<u>Act</u>, allows districts to use curriculum-focused resources to purchase devices for students.

STATE ADVOCACY HIGHLIGHTS



States took action to address unmet needs for remote learning, with **Indiana** and **Ohio** each investing \$250 million for digital devices and connectivity for students.

Nevada provided devices and connectivity for all +485,000 students, and Colorado added a \$5 million grant program to connect 7,500 students.

Alabama expanded its high-speed broadband networks, services and technologies to support students.

Florida Virtual School meets a diverse set of students' needs, with more than 12,500 full-time students and +190 courses—all tuition-free for Florida residents. The online school has served as a vital resource to families during pandemic-related disruptions, more than doubling its prepandemic enrollment.

The Landreths, a military family, also depend on Florida Virtual School for stability in their two sons' education.

"We moved 20 times in 26 years," said Cheryl. But with her sons learning online, the boys don't have to leave their education family.

"During the pandemic, their learning was seamless. We even had other families come to us and ask for ways to make it better for their children."





The 2021 National Summit on Education focused a spotlight session on one of the nation's most dynamic industries—and its critical need for dynamic talent. Led by Governor Asa Hutchinson, the session explored how Arkansas created some of the nation's strongest pathways into the tech sector. Panelists shared how employers and practitioners are building more diverse, creative pathways into industry through a mix of public investment, policy changes and employer buy-in.

STATE ADVOCACY HIGHLIGHTS



Florida leaders passed a comprehensive education-to-workforce package with \$178 million to support a data dashboard, workforce training grants, dual-enrollment scholarships and incentives for college and career readiness.

Ohio created incentives for career readiness, dedicating \$41 million to support an estimated 20,000 students in earning industry-recognized credentials

Arizona stepped up with \$1 million to cover credentialling exams for students across the state.



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Close Learning Gaps

Progress over the past 30 years to close learning gaps has been limited. Almost two-thirds of fourth graders are not performing on grade level in math or reading, and Black and Hispanic students are trailing their white peers by up to two grade levels in those subjects.² Effective state policies have the power to turn that around—by holding schools accountable for student success, ensuring all learners are reading by the end of third grade, directing funding to follow each student and empowering families with transparent information.

Early Literacy Network Convenings

ExcelinEd's Early Literacy Network met in person at the National Summit on Education and virtually during the year. Connecticut, Georgia, Louisiana, Maryland, Missouri and Texas grew the network to 22 states plus Washington, D.C., with 73 total members. Discussions among these expert practitioners explored ExcelinEd's model policy for Aligning Educator Preparation Programs to

the Science of Reading and a State-by-State Analysis of Fundamental Principles. The Network also explored innovative and effective early literacy implementation practices, with strategies and lessons learned serving as the framework for a comprehensive policy guide.



ExcelinEd hosted School Accountability: Answers. Not **Excuses, for Enhanced Student Outcomes** at the 2021 National Summit on Education, sharing ideas for accountability systems that better serve students while also delivering robust information that helps drive achievement.

STATE ADVOCACY HIGHLIGHTS



Early literacy policy improvements advanced successfully in 8 states, with 5 of those states— Arizona. Connecticut. Florida, Tennessee and Wisconsin—investing a total of \$330 million in new funding to support struggling readers and early literacy programs. Assessments garnered support as an essential way to identify pandemic impacts on learning, with 7 states protecting their assessment and accountability policies.



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Remembering our friend, Zach


