
College Readiness in Austin Independent School District and Texas

Results by Student Group, Graduates from 2011 through 2014

Graduates from Austin Independent School District (AISD) in the Classes of 2011 through 2014 were increasingly more likely than their peers statewide to have been college ready in English language arts (ELA), math, and both subjects (Figure 1).

Recent AISD graduates were more likely than their peers in Texas to have met college readiness criteria in English/language arts, math, and both subjects.



Economically disadvantaged, African American, and Hispanic students closed gaps against their Texas peers (Figures 2—4), and White students continued to outperform their peers (Figure 5).

African American AISD graduates closed the college readiness gap between their peers in Texas in English/language arts and both subjects.



Hispanic AISD graduates closed the college readiness gap and surpassed their peers in Texas in English/language arts and both subjects in 2014.




How was college readiness defined?

Students were considered college ready when they met certain criteria on the exit-level Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS), the SAT test, or the ACT test. Students who met one of the following criteria were considered college ready.

English language arts (ELA)

>= 2200 scale score on TAKS ELA and 3 or higher on TAKS essay

or

>= 500 on SAT Critical Reading and >= 1070 SAT Total

or

>= 19 ACT English and >= 23 ACT Composite

Math

>= 2200 scale score on TAKS mathematics

or

>= 500 on SAT Math and >= 1070 SAT Total

or

>= 19 ACT Math and >= 23 ACT Composite

AISD graduates served with special education increasingly outperformed their Texas peers (Figures 6), while AISD graduates identified as English language learners fell behind their Texas peers (Figure 5).

AISD graduates in Special Education increasingly showed greater college readiness than their peers in Texas in English/language arts, math, and both subjects.



