## REPORT ON INTERNATIONAL EDUCATIONAL EXCHANGE

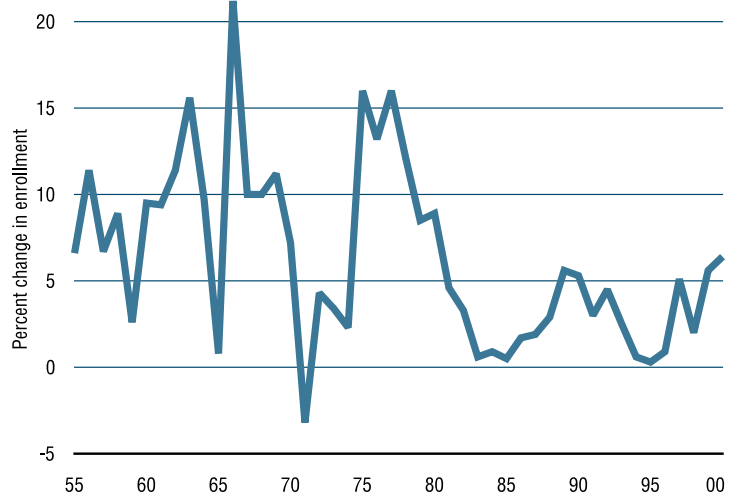
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OPEN DOORS is the only comprehensive information resource on over 547,000 international students in the United States and on the more than 143,000 U.S. students who studied abroad in 2000. The Institute of International Education, the largest and most experienced U.S. higher education exchange agency, has conducted an annual statistical survey of the internationally mobile student population in the United States since 1948, with U.S. government support since 1972.

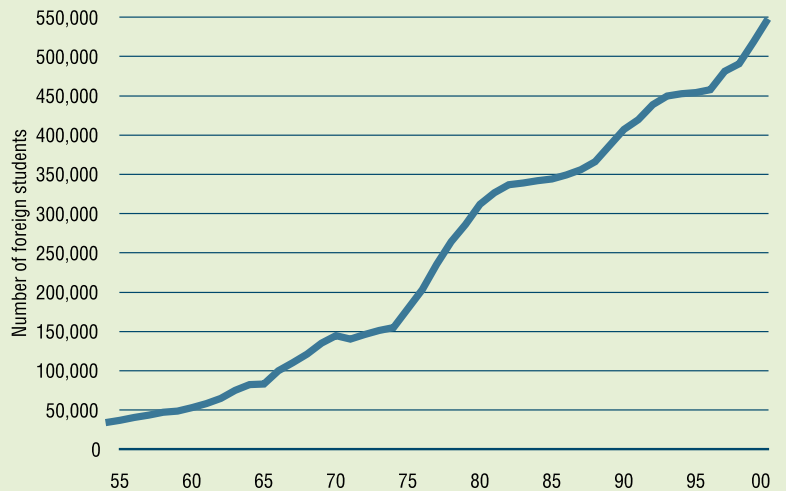

## THE BIG PICTURE

The number of international students studying in the U.S. increased sharply this year to 547,867. This number represents an increase of 6.4% over the previous year, 1999/00, which also saw an increase of 4.8% from 1998/99. The last time that *Open Doors* reported this large a percentage increase was in 1980. Since 1955, the number of international students in the U.S. has, for the most part, grown each year, with plateaus in the mid-1980s and mid-1990s.

While the number of international students enrolled on U.S. campuses has increased more than tenfold over the past 50 years, their percentage of total enrollments in U.S. higher education remains quite small, up from 1.4% to 3.9%. At the more advanced degree levels, and in certain disciplines, foreign students comprise a high percentage of total U.S. graduate student enrollment. More than half of all international students study at the undergraduate level.

International students are defined for the purpose of this census as those individuals who were enrolled for coursework at a U.S. institution of higher education under a temporary student visa. These individuals can include spouses and dependents who arrive in the U.S. with the student if they also take coursework. This does not include refugees, immigrants, and permanent residents.

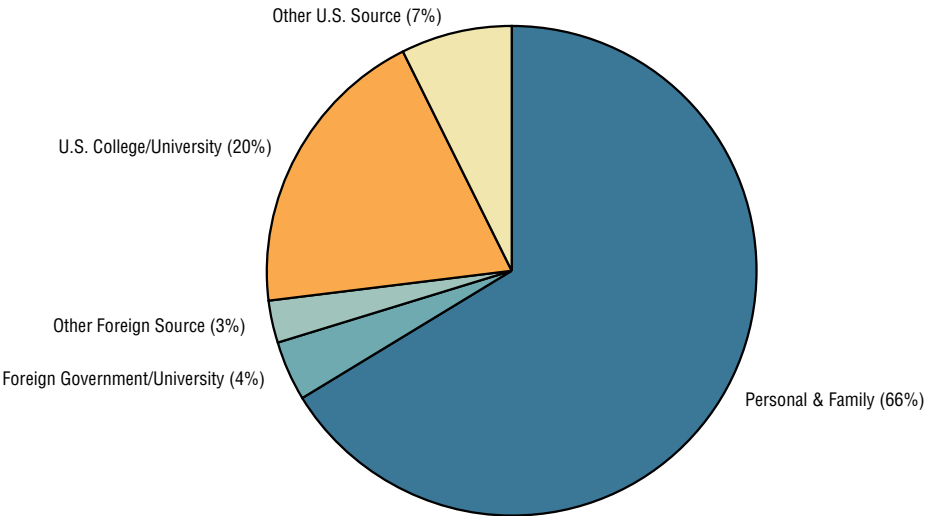

# contributes U.S. economy.

## FINANCIAL CONTRIBUTIONS

**F**oreign students' economic impact on the U.S. is considerable. Educational services was ranked as the nation's fifth largest service sector export in 2000. Foreign students play an important role in the U.S. economy not only on a national level, but also on a local level by contributing more than 11 billion dollars to the U.S. economy through tuition and cost of living expenses, and in some cases, expenses associated with a spouse and other dependents who have come to the U.S. with them. NAFSA estimates that foreign students contribute approximately \$462,000,000 in dependents' expenditures. Foreign students draw from a variety of sources of funding for their U.S. study. Over two-thirds (66%) of foreign students report that personal and family funds are the primary source of funding for their studies in the U.S. More than 80% of international undergraduates (80.7%) fund their studies through personal sources. Just under half of these international graduate students (46.9%) use personal funds as their primary source of funding, with the rest receiving funds from host universities or other sources, most often in the form of research or teaching assistantships.

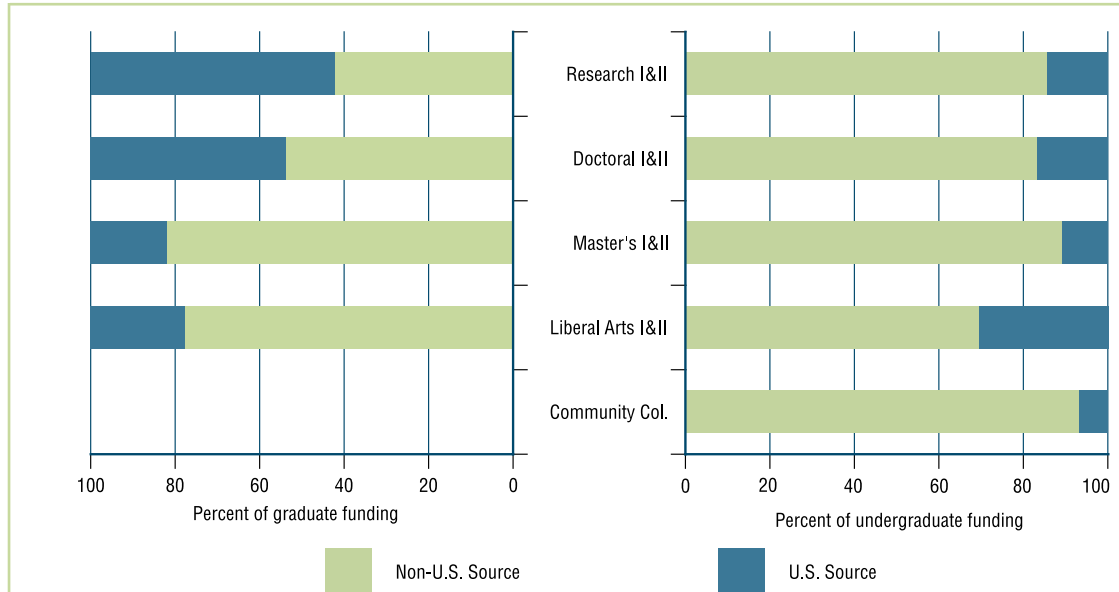


About three-quarters of all international students in the United States receive their primary source of funding from non-U.S. sources.

## FINANCIAL CONTRIBUTIONS

In examining the trends in sources of funding, it is notable that personal and family funds continue to be the primary source of funding for international students in the U.S. and has remained in the mid- to high 60 percent since 1979/80. Over the past 22 years, the U.S. college or university as the primary source of funding has generally increased (9.2% in 1979/80 to 19.8% in 2000/01), while Home Governments and U.S. Governments as primary sources have decreased through the years (13% to 4% and 2% to 0.6%, respectively).

Across all institutional types, personal and family funds as the primary source of funding represent at least 65% of international undergraduate students' funding. A much wider range of personal and family funding exists for graduate students (34.7% to 77.5%). At the undergraduate level, international students at community colleges have the highest percentage of personal funding (86.8%), followed by students at Master's I and II institutions (81.6%), while students at Liberal Arts I & II institutions (25.9%) have the highest U.S. college or university sources of funding. At the graduate level, international students at Master's I & II institutions (77.5%) have the highest percentage of personal funding, followed by Liberal Arts I and II institutions (73.9%), while students at Research I & II institutions (52.8%) have the highest U.S. college or university sources of funding.

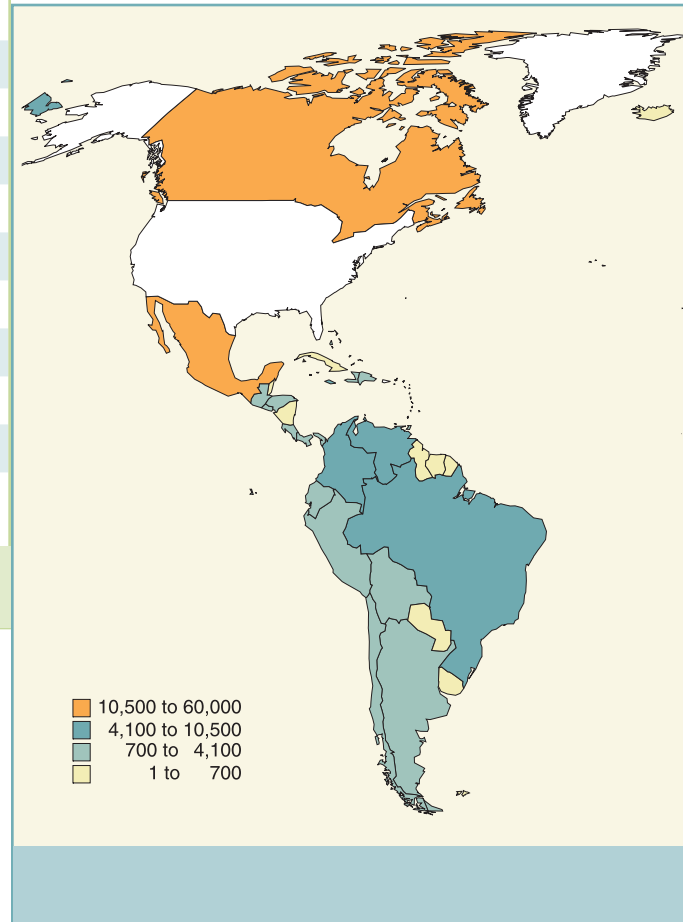

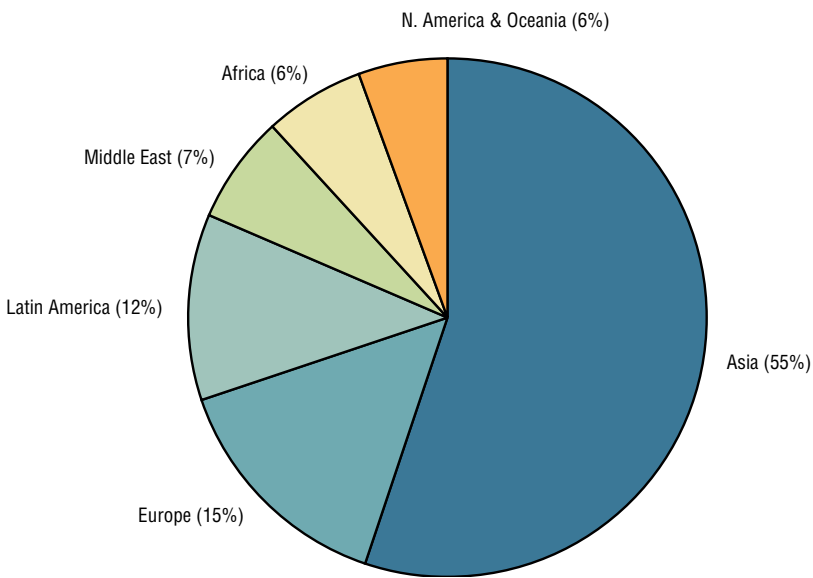

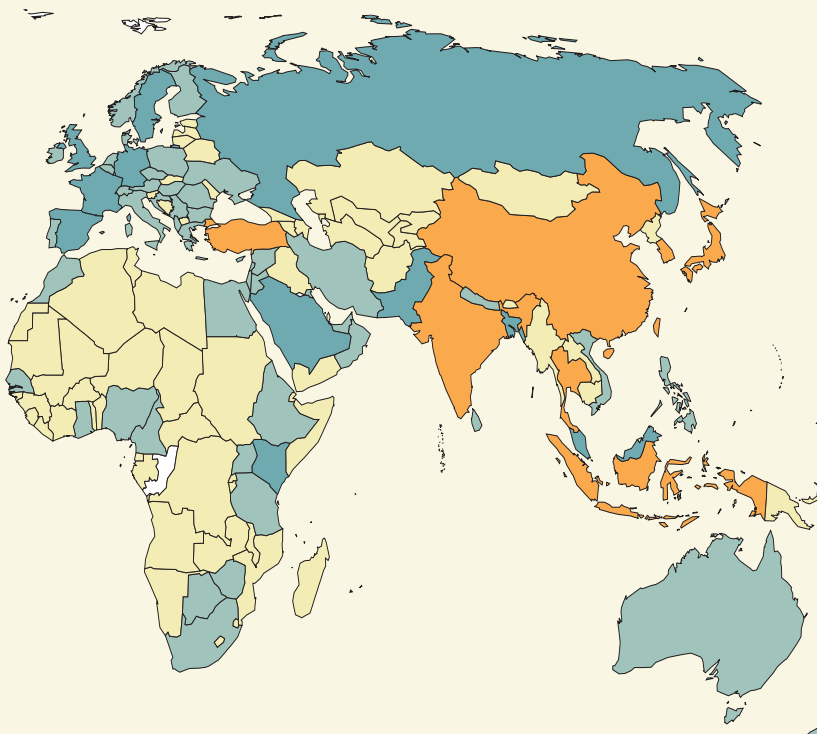




THEIR ORIGINS



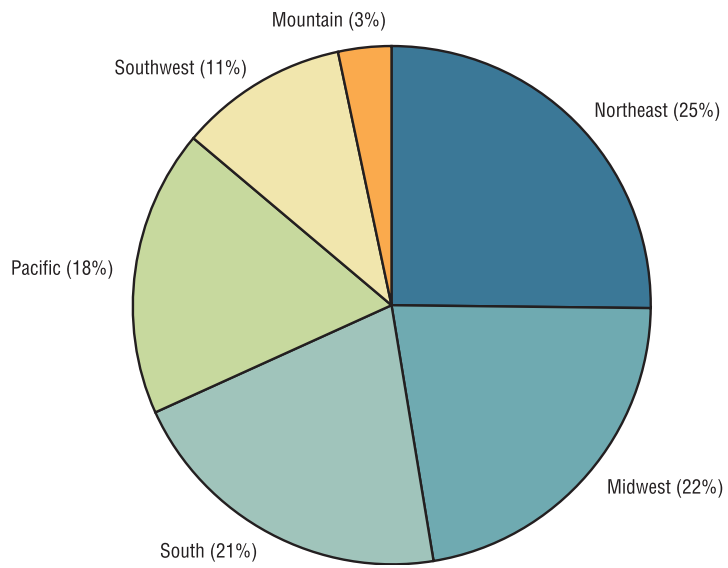
Enrollments from Asia are about twice as strong as from all of Europe and Latin America, the next largest enrollment regions.



Seven of the ten leading places of origin are in Asia and 2000/2001 saw exceptional enrollment growth from China and India.

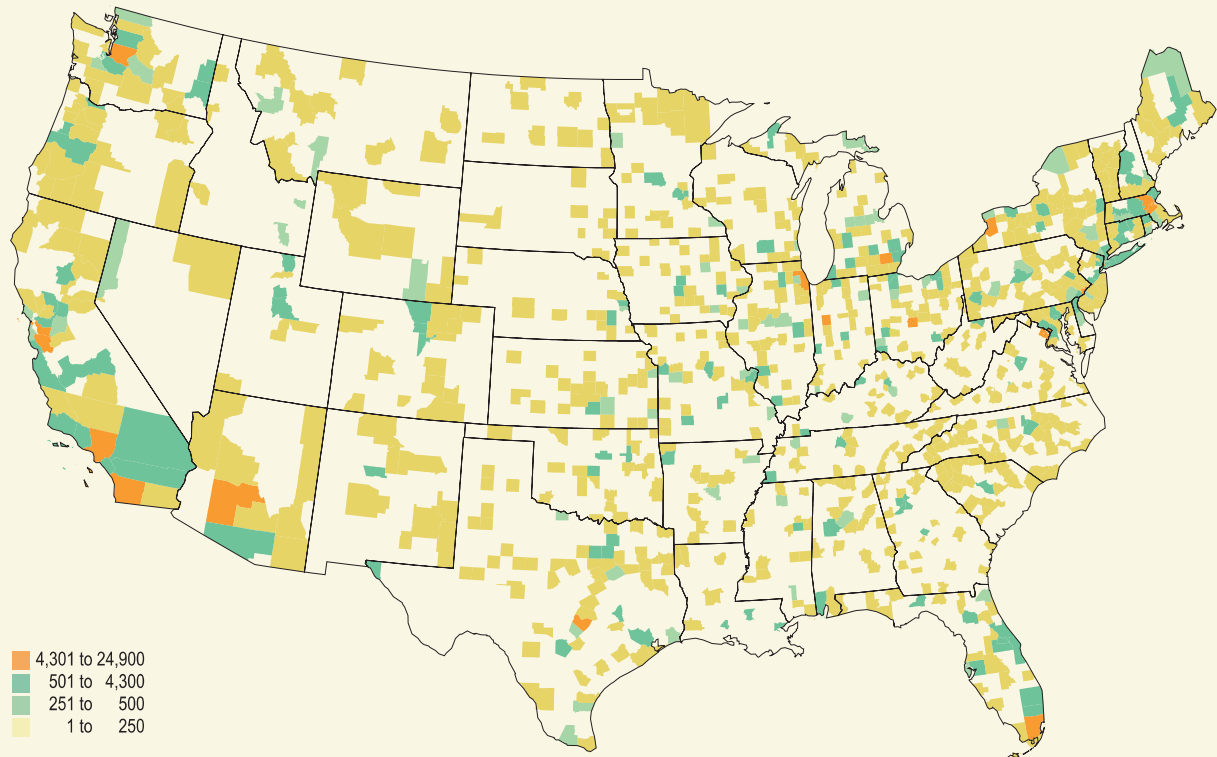
For the third year in a row, China is the leading place of origin of international students, with 59,939 students, up 10.0% from 1999/00. However, the largest percentage increase this year was from India, up 29.1% from the previous year to 54,664. India has surpassed Japan this year as the second leading place of origin. Other countries that saw large increases in the number of students they sent to the U.S. were Canada, up 7.4% and Turkey, up 8.7%.

Over half (55%) of all international students on U.S. campuses come from Asia. In Northeast Asia, it appears that Korea has bounced back from the -8.6% drop in enrollments due to the 1997 financial crisis, with enrollment up 10.9% in 2000/01, building on the previous year's increase of 5.1%. Enrollments from Japan have been flat for the past seven years, with the numbers falling slightly this year (-0.8%). While Taiwan continues to be among the leading places of origin, its numbers are also down this year (-2.3%). In Southeast Asia, student numbers from Thailand and Indonesia are slightly higher this year, while Malaysia's numbers continue to fall since 1997, down once again this year by -14.1%. Europe follows Asia as the next leading region of origin, representing 15% of total international enrollments, followed closely by Latin America, at 12%, the Middle East at 7%, followed by Africa and North America & Oceania, each with 6% of the total foreign student enrollment.

## U.S. DESTINATIONS



Over one-fifth of all international students in the U.S. are concentrated in just ten counties in the U.S., located in seven states and the nation's capital. Los Angeles County continues to host the largest number of international students for the third consecutive year, followed closely by New York County (Manhattan). Within these counties, the majority of international students are centered in a small number of major metropolitan areas and college/university towns.

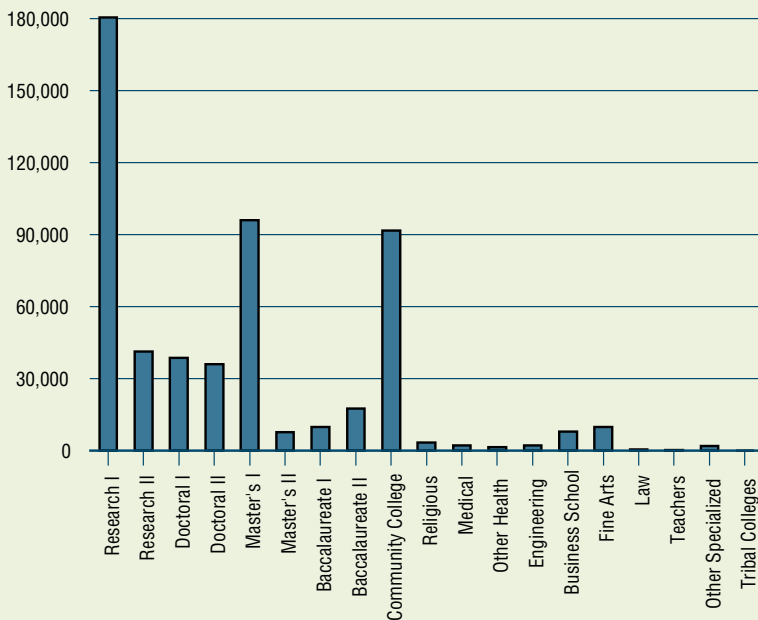
International students are located throughout the U.S., with a slight majority in the Northeast (25%), followed by the Midwest (22%), the South (21%), the Pacific (18%), the Southwest (11%), and the Mountain region (3%). Within these regions, and within states, student enrollment patterns vary. U.S. geographical/regional preferences of international students from certain world areas can be discerned by looking at the top places of origin. Many South American students, such as Venezuelans, Colombians, and Brazilians, are studying in Florida. Large numbers of Mexican students are studying in Texas. Many East Asian students from China, Hong Kong, Japan, Korea, and Taiwan are studying on the West Coast in California, Oregon, and Washington. Many Canadian students are studying in the Northern Tier states of Michigan, Minnesota, and North Dakota.

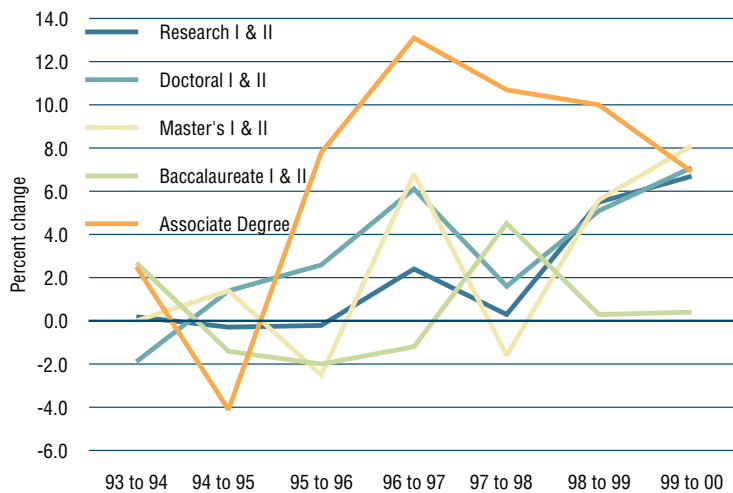

## COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES

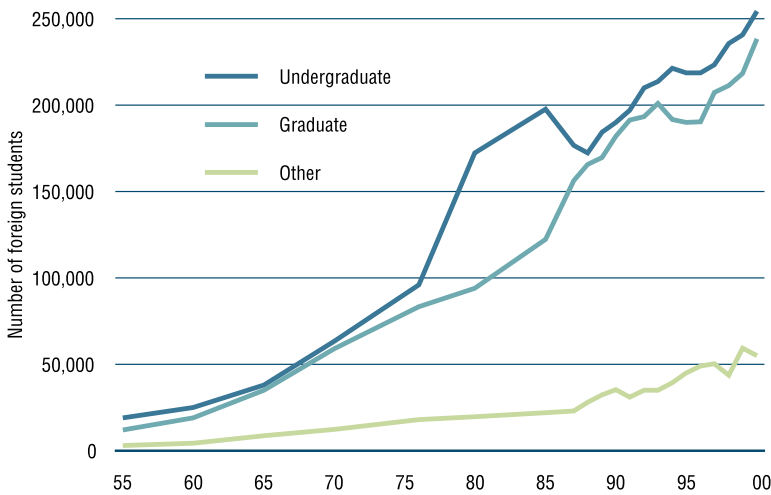
The U.S. has a large, diverse, and flexible higher education system, with opportunities to study in various types of institutions and programs. Over 2,500 institutions host international students, who study at institutions from all of the Carnegie Classification types.

Research I universities hosted the most international students once again this year, followed by Master's I institutions and Community Colleges. By far, these three institutional types hosted more international students than all the other types combined, with 368,169 students representing 67.2% of the total. International enrollments at Baccalaureate I & II institutions seem to have leveled off once again, as in the previous year. On the other hand, after declines in 1996/97, Master's I & II, Doctoral I & II, and Research I & II institutions are seeing sharp increases since 1997/98. Associate Degree institutions have been experiencing a declining rate of international enrollments since the sharp increases from 1994/95 to 1996/97, though the total enrollment continues to grow. Community college enrollments grew by 49.7% between 1993/94 and 2000/01. This growth was larger than growth in all other Carnegie types combined.

New York University once again hosted the largest number of international students, with a total of 5,399 students. Most of the leading institutions are located in major metropolitan areas.

FIELDS OF STUDY

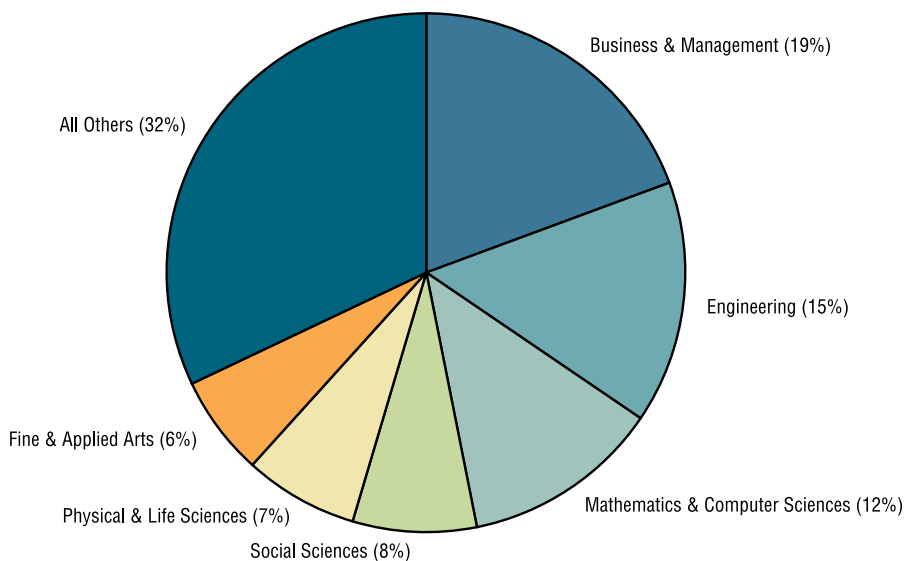
**B**usiness and Management remains the most popular field of study among international students, with 106,043 or 19.4% of the total. Engineering and Mathematics/Computer Sciences are the next largest fields, with 83,186 (15.2%) and 67,825 (12.4%) respectively of the total. For the second consecutive year, Mathematics and Computer Sciences experienced the largest increase (up 18.4%). This is nearly the same increase as the previous year (up 18.7%). This large growth is mostly due to the increases in Chinese and Indian student enrollments, as these students tend to come to the U.S. as graduate students in these fields.

The number of female international students has increased each year since 1977/98, with the exception of two years. This year, women represent almost 43% of international enrollments, a record high. International students in the U.S. are overwhelmingly single (84.7%), and possess an F Visa (85.8%). This has been the case historically, as well.

Undergraduates continue to outnumber graduates in 2000/01. There have been more significant enrollment shifts in the undergraduate international student population over the years than among the graduate and other international students. From the mid-70s to the mid-80s, the gap between undergraduate and graduate international students was very large, but it has been closing in recent years, more or less proportional to the numbers reported in the pre-1970s.

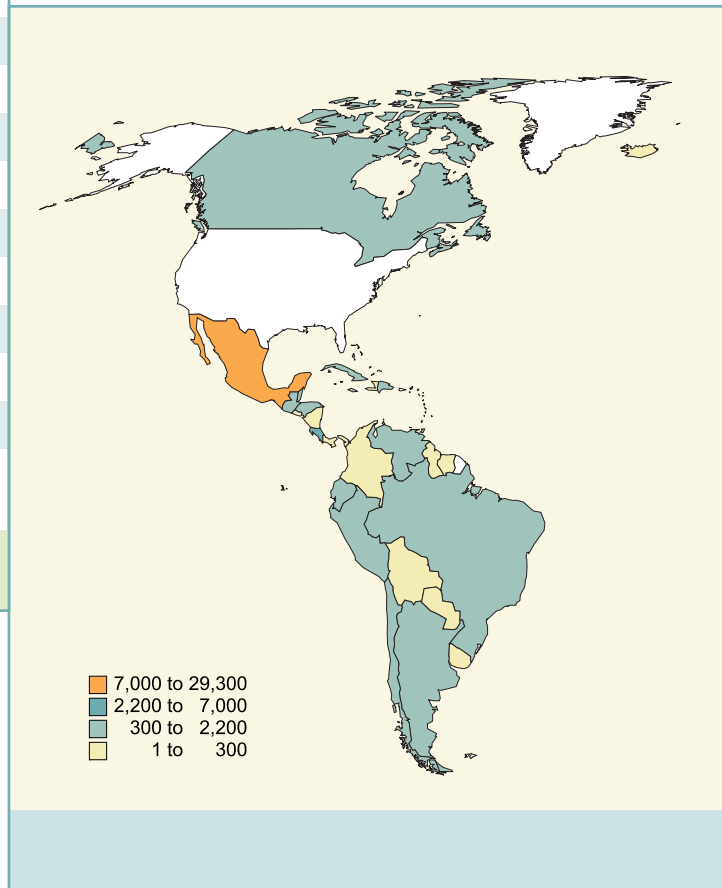

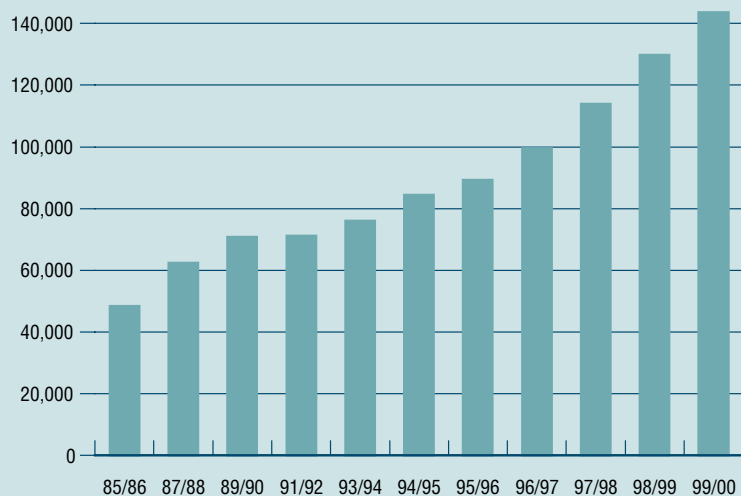
U.S. STUDY ABROAD



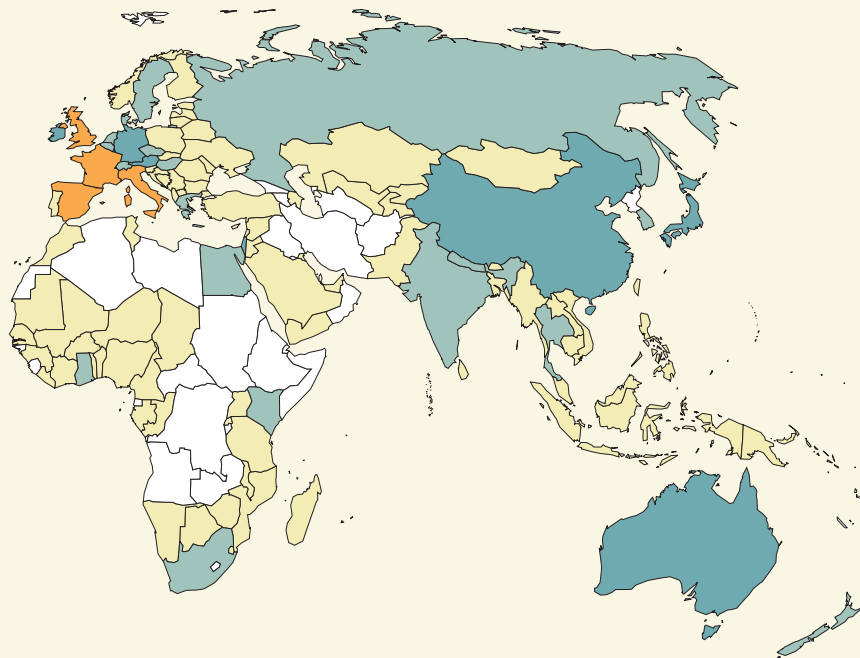
.S. study abroad activity has been steadily increasing since the mid-1990s (1994/95), with the most dramatic increases occurring since 1996/97. This year's survey showed a 10.6% increase over the previous year to 143,590 students receiving credit for study abroad in 1999/00. This represents the fourth year in row of double digit increases. Over the last five years, study abroad activity from U.S. institutions of higher education increased 61%.

Europe still remains the most popular host region for study abroad, with the United Kingdom once again the leading destination, with 20.4% of all U.S. study abroad students, followed by Spain, Italy, and France. However, study abroad to other more diverse and non-traditional regions and countries has been increasing. Since the mid-1980s, Latin America has been enjoying large study abroad gains; the numbers of U.S. students going to this region have doubled. Mexico and Costa Rica are the two most popular destinations in Latin America, representing 5.1% and 2.4% of all U.S. study abroad students.

The largest percentage increases in U.S. students studying abroad have been to China, Ireland, and Austria. There have also been double-digit increases in U.S. students abroad to Israel, Australia, Italy, France, and Spain.

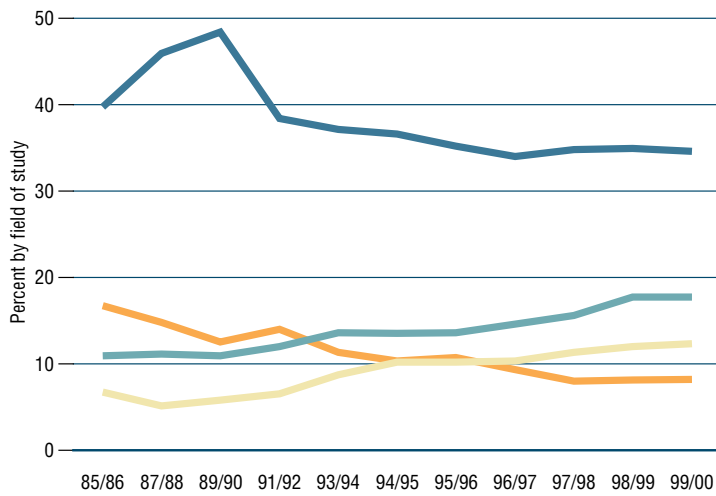


Since the early 1990s, the number of U.S. students studying abroad has increased 61%.

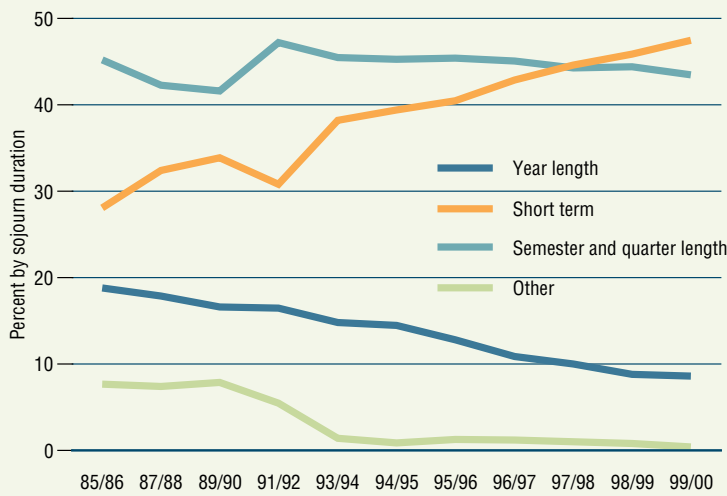


Western Europe is still the leading destination of choice for U.S. study abroad students, but other destinations are attracting a growing number of students.

## U. S. STUDY ABROAD

### Fields of Study

Students who studied abroad this year majored in a wide range of fields of study. The most popular major among study abroad students was the social sciences. Over time, however, students in the “traditional” majors for study abroad have decreased. The percentage of U.S. students abroad majoring in the social sciences and humanities fields decreased and has largely remained static since 1996/97, while students majoring in foreign languages have been dropping since 1991/92. On the other hand, business and management students studying abroad, as well as those studying in the technical fields, have steadily increased.

Business and management is now the second largest major among study abroad students.

### Sojourns

The trend over the last several years has been towards shorter study abroad sojourns. Academic year study periods have been declining over the past decade, as have stays of one semester and one quarter. On the other hand, short-term sojourns (summer, January term, or sojourns of eight weeks or less) have been growing in popularity, fueling the increase in the number of study abroad students.

### By Carnegie Category

The trend toward shorter program duration is reflected across Carnegie Categories. Long-term programs of an academic and/or calendar year represented just a small percentage of study abroad sojourns across the Carnegie Categories. In all but the baccalaureate institutions, the short-term programs such as Summer, January Term, or programs of less than 8 weeks’ duration were the most popular length of sojourns among study abroad students.

### Study Abroad’s Impact

Study abroad activity’s impact on the internationalization of campuses can be gauged by looking at the total number of students studying abroad from each institution, or the percentage of students who graduate with a study abroad experience. When looking at the total numbers sent abroad annually, the larger institutions tend to be prominently featured. However, many of the smaller institutions send large proportions of their student population abroad; thus, it is important to look at the participation rate for institutions as well.

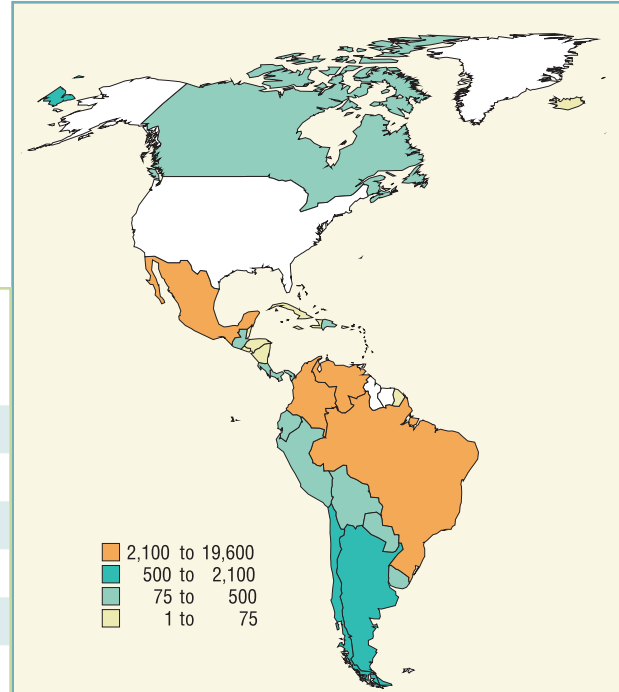

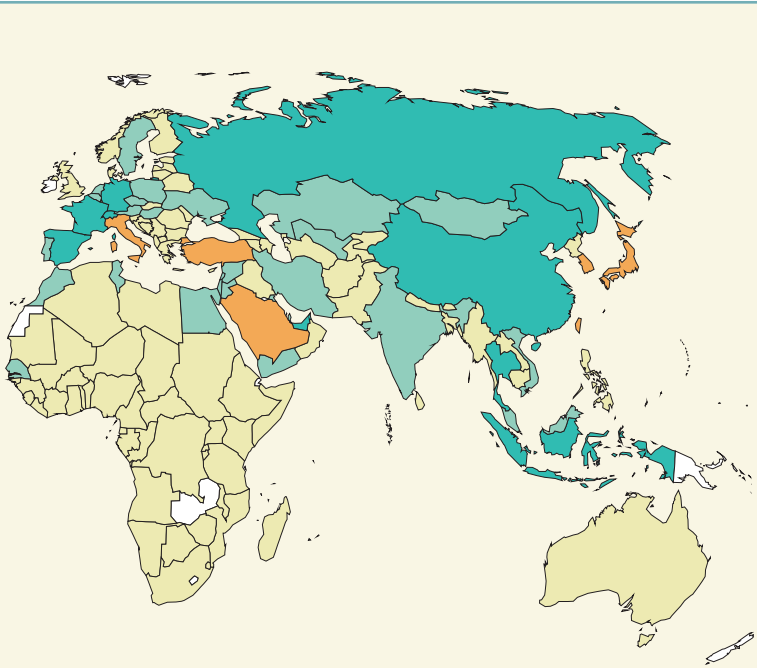

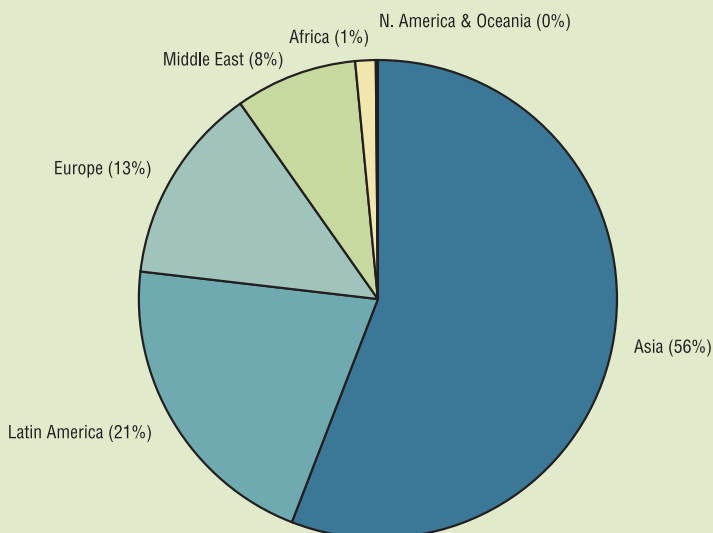
Over 48% of U.S. IEP students come from the top three places of origin, all of which are in Asia.

## INTENSIVE ENGLISH

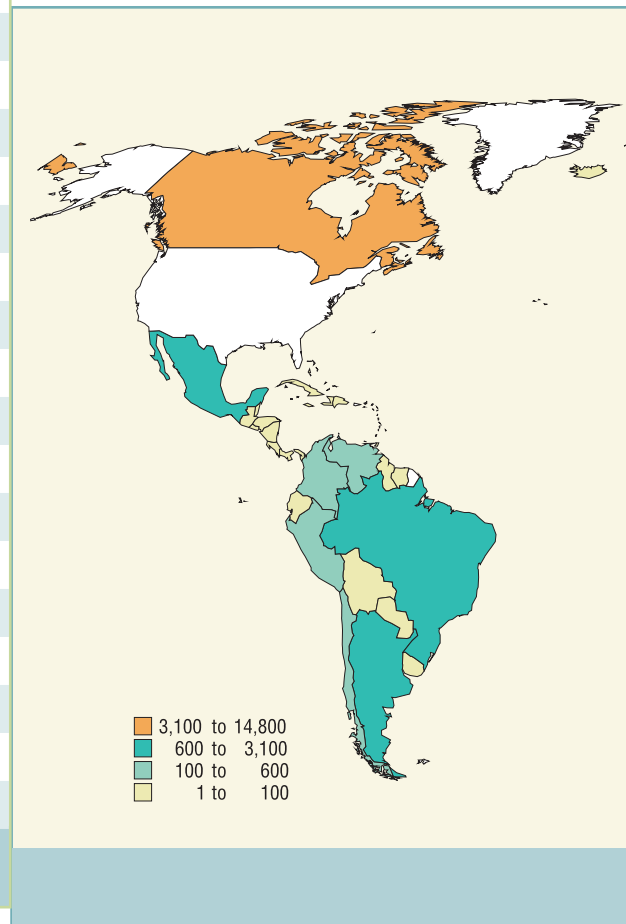
This year, 85,238 international students were enrolled in intensive English language programs in the U.S. Fully 56% of all intensive English students came from Asia, followed by 21% from Latin America, 13% from Europe, 8% from the Middle East, 1% from Africa, and a negligible percent from North America and Oceania. Five of the leading places of origin are in Asia, four in Latin America, two in Europe, and two in the Middle East. Japan is the leading place of origin for both student enrollments and student-weeks totals, and thus sends the largest percentage of intensive English students, followed closely by Korea and Taiwan, all in the double-digit percentage category. A “student-week” represents one student studying for one week.

This is the second year that IIE and the boards of AAIEP and UCIEP, the leading professional associations for U.S. Intensive English Programs, have collaborated to collect comprehensive data on the IEP industry. This year’s survey period includes international students enrolled between January 1, 2000 and December 31, 2000. This year, the e-mail survey pool of 467 programs included the 257 members of AAIEP and UCIEP and also 210 non-member programs drawn from IIE’s *Intensive English USA 2000* directory. Responses were obtained from 148 AAIEP and UCIEP members (57.6%) and 37 non-members.

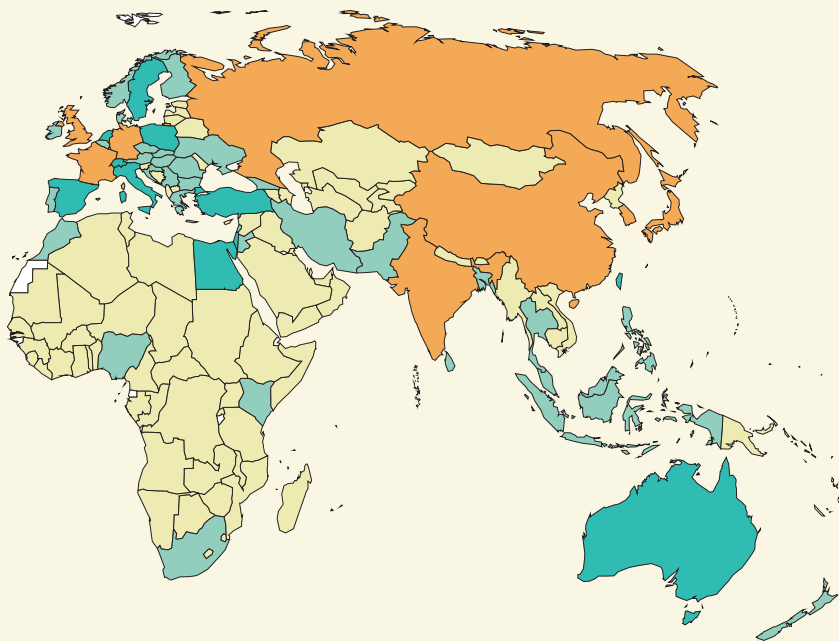

The number of foreign scholars at U.S. higher education institutions increased 6.8% to 79,651. This year's growth builds on the previous five years' growth in foreign scholar flows to the U.S. China is the leading place of origin of the 79,651 foreign scholars in the U.S. (18.5%). Japan is a distant second (7.4%), followed closely by the Republic of Korea (7.3%). The majority of foreign scholars come from Asia and Europe. Nine of the top 20 places of origin are from Europe, and five are from Asia. This is in contrast to the foreign student enrollments at U.S. higher education institutions, where Asian students are a clear majority of foreign students, with Europeans a distant second.

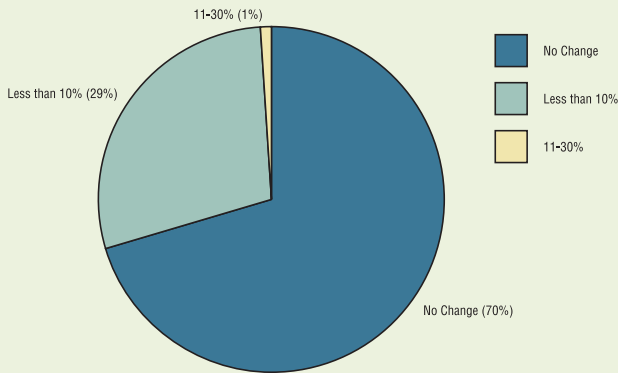
Foreign scholars on U.S. campuses are generally male (70%), hold J-1 visas, and are largely engaged in research activities. Most of the foreign scholars are in the U.S. conducting research in the sciences. The leading field of specialization among the foreign scholars is the health sciences (26%), followed by life and biological sciences (14.7%), and the physical sciences (14.7%). A large proportion of foreign scholars are also involved in engineering research. A small percent are primarily involved in teaching.

## IMPACT OF SEPTEMBER 11, 2001 ON INTERNATIONAL EDUCATIONAL EXCHANGE

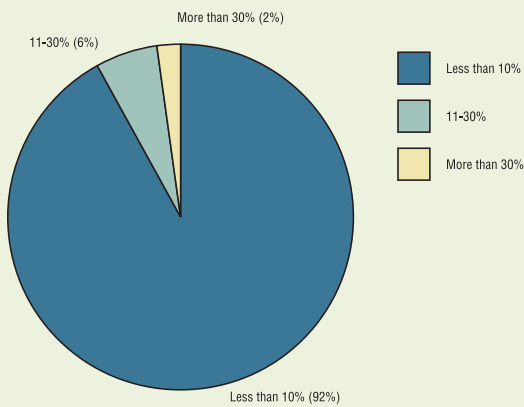
The terrorist attacks of September 11 have produced impacts worldwide well beyond the immediate events of the day, and have affected various industries and fields, including international education. These tragic events have thrust international education into the spotlight and required educators to consider the meaning and purpose of international education.

In order to fill the information void and gauge the impact of 9/11 on international student exchanges and on our own field, the Institute conducted an online opinion poll of its approximately 650 institutional members through IIENetworker, an online membership network, in October 2001. Nearly 600 international education professionals responded to the survey, which polled three areas: international students in the U.S., students studying abroad from the U.S., and the importance of international education post-September 11. The overall finding of the survey was that the majority of international educators reported minimal impact on U.S. campus exchanges following September 11. 99% of international educators reported that there was little (less than 10%) or no change in international students returning home. 92% reported that there was little change (less than 10%) in U.S. students' plans to study abroad. 97% reported that international education was equally or more important in the aftermath of September 11.

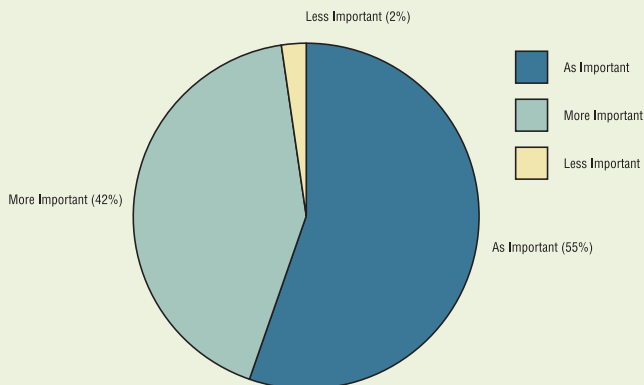
The events of September 11 underscore the need for better understanding among nations and peoples. The findings of the survey and comments from these international educators reveal that for both students and educators around the world, the events of September 2001 did not diminish their commitment to international education nor their willingness to go abroad. Their comments clearly expressed the view that the best way to promote peace, understanding, and "open minds to the world" is to continue international education. They also made clear that on their campuses, the disaster has created more awareness of and curiosity about other cultures. There was overwhelming agreement that it is more important now than ever before to promote international educational exchanges.

### History of the Census

Since its founding in 1919, the Institute of International Education (IIE) has conducted an annual census of foreign students in the United States. For the first 30 years, IIE and the Committee on Friendly Relations Among Foreign Students carried out this effort jointly. IIE's first independent publication of the results of the annual census was *Education for One World*, containing data for the 1948/1949 academic year. It was renamed *Open Doors* in 1954/1955, and began receiving USIA support (now Department of State) in the early 1970s. *Open Doors* is generally considered the primary source for basic statistics about foreign students, foreign scholars, and international students in Intensive English Programs in the United States. The response to this year's *Open Doors* survey (91.3% in 2000/2001) means that the survey constitutes the most comprehensive set of data on the U.S. foreign student population. IIE also collects baseline data on the participation of U.S. students in for-credit study abroad activity. The Study Abroad Survey is the only national source of information about the involvement of U.S. college students in for-credit international sojourns.

### Imputation

Throughout this document, student counts other than the total foreign student enrollments, U.S. study abroad totals, scholar totals, and IEP totals are determined by imputation. Estimates of the number of students for each of the variables collected by the various surveys are imputed from the total number of students reported. For each imputation, base or raw counts are multiplied by a correction factor that reflects the ratio of difference between the sum of the categories being imputed and the total number of students reported by institutions. It should be noted that student numbers vary slightly within this publication. Due to rounding, percentages do not always add up to 100%. This is also true for some imputations. In these instances the total percent column is listed as 100% to indicate that all categories are accounted for. A relatively large discrepancy exists between the academic level figures reported by country and those provided for all foreign students in general. This discrepancy results from the differential response rates to the nationality question and the academic level question.

**Country Classification System**

The classification of countries into regional groupings that is used throughout this report follows IIE practices that were originated when the *Open Doors* Census was first conducted in 1948. (Table 44)

**Fields of Study and U.S. Regions**

The fields of study used in this book are those from *A Classification of Instructional Programs, 1990*, published by the U.S. Department of Education, National Center for Education Statistics (NCES). See Table 45 for a list of major fields of study.

### About the Annual Census of Foreign Students

The Higher Education Resource Group of IIE obtained the data presented in *Open Doors 2001* through a survey conducted, in Fall 2000 and Spring 2001, of campus officials in 2,699 regionally accredited institutions of higher education in the United States. Of the institutions surveyed, 2,464 or 91.3%, responded to the questionnaire, as is shown in Table 46. The response rate, although always high, has fluctuated over the history of the Census, reaching the lowest point in the mid-1970s. However, in the past decade it has been very high, ranging from 92.6% in 1979/1980 to 99.5% in 1987/1988, then dipping to 91.3% this year.

Over nine-tenths (2,344) of the institutions that responded to the survey reported enrolling international students (Table 46). Of the schools with international students, a total of 509 (representing 20.7%) provided only total foreign student counts (Step 1), as shown in Table 47. The majority (79.3%), however, provided information not only on the total but also on the students' countries of origin, fields of study, academic levels, sex, and other characteristics (Step 2) as well.

A high proportion of the colleges and universities with foreign students sent data on some or all of the characteristics on the questionnaire, as Table 48 shows. Some variables commanded a greater number of responses: data on country of

origin exist for 83.6% of all foreign students reported, and field of study breakdowns for 81.3%. Conversely, information on the students' primary source of funding and on their marital status is available for less than half of the total number reported (41.9% and 41.7%, respectively). This year's fall in overall response rate is a concern as is the slide in reporting for individual variables.

**About the Foreign Scholar Survey**

For the purposes of this survey, foreign scholars are defined as non-immigrant, non-student academics (teachers and/or researchers, administrators). Other scholars may be affiliated with U.S. institutions for other activities such as conferences, colloquia, observations, consultations, or other short-term professional development activities. The survey was limited to doctoral degree-granting institutions where most F Visa scholars are based. This year was the second year that the survey was conducted through the web and a more detailed breakout of visa categories was sought. The institutions polled were asked to give us as much information as possible on scholars who were at their institutions for part or all of the period beginning on July 1, 2000 and ending June 30, 2001. The forms requested information on the primary function of the scholars (research, teaching, both, or other), on their geographic origin, field of specialization, sex, and immigration status. Responses were received from

281 of the 347 institutions polled, a response rate of 81.0%, which is up from the 79.4% obtained last year. Not all institutions reporting foreign scholars in 2000/2001 were able to provide detailed information on the characteristics of their scholars. The proportion of institutions that were able to give breakdowns for individual variables ranged from 85.5% for visa status to 76.9% for primary function. The general increase in response rates to individual variables over the previous year seen in Table 49 may be attributed to an increased level of familiarity with the web-based data collection system.

#### About the U.S. Study Abroad Survey

This survey focuses on study abroad for academic credit. The study abroad population has been narrowly defined as only those students who received academic credit from a U.S. accredited institution of higher education after they returned from their study abroad experience. Students studying abroad without credit transfers are not included here nor are U.S. students enrolled overseas for degrees. The number of students who receive academic credit is inevitably lower than the number of all students who go abroad. Hence, the figures presented here give a conservative picture of study abroad activity. Study abroad information was obtained from 1,076 or 84.8% of the 1,269 surveyed institutions. Not all institutions that reported giving credit for study abroad

in 1999/2000 provided detailed information about the characteristics of the students, as shown in Table 50. The proportion of schools that gave breakdowns for individual variables ranged from 45.7% for race/ethnicity to 92.5% for duration of the sojourn. The survey included an item on internships and work abroad for the second year. This year we added an item capturing the number of international students participating in study abroad sojourns.

#### About the Intensive English Program Survey

Last year, IIE and two leading professional intensive English associations, AAIEP and UCIEP, joined to inaugurate a new initiative to collect national data that reflects IEP activity in the U.S. Now in its second year, this effort to collect data with the sponsorship and support of the professional associations reflects the continued growth of independent and affiliated proprietary programs.

Data elements included program sponsorship, the percentage of students intending to continue further (non-IEP) study in the U.S., program duration (18 hours or more; 18 hours or less), and place of origin. Student totals reflected both headcount enrollment and enrollment by “student-weeks.” One student-week equals one student studying for one week. This year the number

of institutions invited to participate was broadened to include non-AAIEP and UCIEP institutions. These Intensive English Programs were taken from IIE’s *Intensive English USA (IEUSA) 2000* directory. In all, 467 programs were contacted by e-mail (257 AAIEP & UCIEP programs and 210 non-members) and returns were obtained from 185 programs for an overall response

rate of 39.6%. Responses were obtained from 148 AAIEP & UCIEP institutions, a return of 57.6%, which is down from the 61.5% obtained from this group last year. Returns were obtained from just 37 non-member programs or a 17.6% response rate for this group. Because of the expansion in the universe of programs, it is not possible to directly compare student totals obtained this year with those reported over the past years or even from last year’s IEP survey. The 85,238 students reported this year reflects student enrollments throughout the year. The mix of reporting institutions reflects university and college-affiliated programs as well as large for-profit entities that offer English language training. As with our other surveys, not all programs providing total numbers could provide detailed breakouts of place of origin (95.1% of students), duration of study in student-weeks (95.7% of programs), and the percent of students pursuing further study (77.8% of programs).
