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
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O P E N D O O R S is the only comprehensive information resource on over 582,000 international students in the United States in 2001/2002 and on the more than 154,000 U.S. students who studied abroad in 2000/2001. The Institute of International Education, the largest and most experienced U.S. higher education exchange agency, has conducted an annual statistical survey of the internationally mobile student population in the United States since 1948, with U.S. government support since 1972.

THE BIG PICTURE

n general, the number of international students in the U.S. has increased each year, with plateaus in the mid-1980s and mid-1990s. This year's 6.4% growth in international enrollments builds on the same percentage increase from the previous year, 2000/01. The 12.8% increase seen over the past two years is the largest two-year rise since 1981.

While international student numbers have grown sharply since the early years of the census, their percentage of the total U.S. higher education enrollment has not grown proportionally. In 1954/55, international students made up 1.4% of U.S. higher education enrollment. Almost half a century and 17 times the number of students later, the percentage was just 4.3% in 2001/02. More than half of all international students are undergraduate students. International students comprise a larger proportion of the higher education enrollment total at the graduate levels (13.7%), and especially in certain disciplines.

For the purpose of the *Open Doors* International Student Census, international students are defined as those individuals who were enrolled for coursework at a U.S. institution of higher education under a temporary visa. These individuals may include spouses and dependents who arrive in the United States with the student if they take coursework, as well. They do not include refugees, immigrants, and permanent residents.





FINANCIAL CONTRIBUTIONS

nternational students' presence in the U.S. is felt not just on campuses nationwide, but also on the U.S. economy locally and nationally. Student expenditures include tuition and cost of living expenses for themselves, and often expenses associated with their spouse and dependents who accompany them to the United States. The U.S. Department of Commerce ranked educational services as the nation's fifth largest service sector export in the year 2000, contributing almost \$11 billion to the economy.

International students in the U.S. fund their education from a variety of sources. Many international graduate students, especially at Research Institutions, obtain research or teaching assistantships or other U.S.-based sources of funding. On the other hand, undergraduate internationals rely heavily on non-U.S. sources to fund their education. At Community Colleges, 91% of internationals have non-U.S. sources of funding for their education. This is not surprising, since community colleges are the most affordable of the different types of higher education institutions in the U.S., and rarely provide scholarships or assistantships. For international students in general, over two-thirds (68%) utilize personal and family sources as their primary source of funding. Undergraduate students have the largest percentage of personal funding for their U.S. studies (80.4%), while graduate students have a much smaller percentage of personal funding (51.5%).

FINANCIAL CONTRIBUTIONS

ersonal & family funds have always been the primary source of funding for international students studying in the U.S., and continued to be the primary source in 2001/02. Since 1979/80, the percentage has been in the mid to high 60%, and has remained steady at approximately 68% of international students' funding sources since 1994/95. In the 22 years from 1979/80 to 2001/02, U.S. College/University funding has increased (9.2% to 20.6%), Home Government/University funding has decreased (13.0% to 3.7%), and direct U.S. Government funding has seen a progressive decrease (2.0% to 0.3%).


Personal & family funds comprise at least 62.2% of undergraduate students' funding sources. International graduate students typically posses a wider range of personal & family funding, ranging from a low of 39.8% to a high of 79.4%. Undergraduates at Community Colleges have the highest percentage of personal funding (87%), while graduate students at Research Institutions have the lowest percentage of personal funding (39.8%). Undergraduates at Liberal Arts I & II Institutions have the highest percentage of U.S. College/University funding (27.8%). Graduates at Research I & II Institutions have the highest percentage of U.S. College/ University funding (50.4%), with much of that representing federal funds distributed indirectly to students through research or teaching assistantships.





North America & Oceania (5%) Africa (6%) Alia (56%) Europe (14%)







THEIR ORIGINS

ndia has surpassed China as the leading place of origin for international students studying in the United States. The 66,836 Indian students represent a 22.3% increase from the previous year's total of 54,664. India's total represents 11.5% of the U.S. international student total enrollment. Other places of origin with large percentage increases in 2001/02 are Pakistan, (up 24.4% to 8,644), Colombia (up 19.3% to 8,068), Mexico (up 17.3% to 12,518), and Turkey (up 10.1% to 12,091). The leading places of origin in U.S. higher education vary by institutional type.


Fully 56% of international students are from Asia, as are the five leading places of origin. Two Asian places of origin ranked after India also have had large percentage increases: China ranked number two with a 5.5% increase, followed by Korea (up 7.4%). The majority of the Asian places of origin have economies that have begun to recover from the 1997 economic crisis. Of the Asian places of origin represented in the top 15 leading places of origin, only Indonesia's enrollments have decreased, reflecting its continuing economic slump.

Europe is the next leading region of origin, with 14% of total enrollment, followed by Latin America (12%), Middle East (7%), Africa (6%), and North America & Oceania (5%). Enrollments from Europe and North America & Oceania have declined slightly from the year before (down 1% each).

U.S. DESTINATIONS

nternational students in the United States are highly concentrated. More than 30% of all international students (174,902) are found in just 10 very large Metropolitan Statistical Areas. The United States Office of Management and Budget defines these areas as a core area containing a large population nucleus, together with adjacent communities having a high degree of economic and social integration with that core. The New York MSA hosts the largest number of international students (35,737). Four of the leading 10 MSAs are found between Boston and Washington, D.C. Three of the leading MSAs are on California's coast between San Francisco and Los Angeles, while two are located in Texas. The Chicago MSA is the leading area in the Midwest.


In addition to MSA concentrations, large concentrations of international student groups from certain world areas can be found within the different geographical regions of the U.S., and within states. Often, U.S. geographical and regional preferences of international students from certain world areas can be discerned by examining the top places of origin. Many South American students, such as Venezuelans, Colombians, and Brazilians, are studying in Florida. Large numbers of Mexican students are studying in Texas. Many East Asian students from China, Hong Kong, Japan, Korea, and Taiwan are studying on the West Coast in California, Oregon, and Washington. Many Canadian students are studying in the Northern Tier states of Michigan, Minnesota, and North Dakota.



COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES


.S. higher education is characterized by a diversity of institutional types and programs, categorized into the Carnegie Classification of Institutions of Higher Education. While nearly 2,500 institutions of all types hosted international students in 2001/02, Research I Institutions still enroll the largest group of international students.

Community Colleges' international enrollments have continued their strong growth, with a 61.3% increase since 1993. International students are attracted to Community Colleges for the same reasons American students are: low-cost, quality education, offering flexible and innovative programs of study not found at the traditional four-year colleges and universities. Community Colleges are also characteristic of the U.S. higher educational system, an option not found in many other countries.

The other institutional types all had increases in international enrollment totals as well, but their rates of growth differed. Baccalaureate Institutions had a sharp increase in the rate of enrollment, after flat growth the previous year. Prior to 2001, these institutions had decreasing rates of enrollment since 1997/98. In 2001, Master's Institutions' rate of enrollment declined, while Doctoral Institutions increased, and Research Institutions declined slightly. Unlike the Baccalaureate Institutions, these three institutional types had increases in their rates of enrollment since 1997/98.

enrollments in the U.S.





FIELDS OF STUDY

n examining the profile of international students in the United States, undergraduate students outnumbered graduate students once again in 2001/02. This academic level gap was largest from 1976 to 1986, but it has returned to the pre-1970s proportion, especially in recent years. Historically, undergraduate enrollment has undergone larger enrollment shifts. While the male/female ratio has become more balanced in comparison to the earliest years of international student study in the United States, male students still outnumber female students. The gender gap has been narrowing every year since 1977/78, with the exception of two years. The overwhelming majority of international students in the U.S. hold an F Visa. This percentage has increased through the years, from 77.4% in 1977/78 to 86.2% in 2001/02.


International students studying in the U.S. pursue a variety of fields of study. Business & Management remains the most popular field of study among international students, but Mathematics & Computer Sciences and the Humanities saw the largest percentage increases. There are many reasons for the sustained growth in Engineering and Mathematics & Computer Sciences; it may largely reflect the increases in graduate Chinese and Indian enrollments. The most popular fields of study vary by type of institution, as well. Community Colleges tend to attract students who pursue "other" fields of study, as they offer many non-traditional, interdisciplinary or innovative programs.





Western Europe continues to be the destination of choice for U.S. study abroad, but non-traditional destinations are attracting a growing number of students.


U.S. STUDY ABROAD

S. students increasingly include study abroad as a part of their higher education. In 2000/01, 154,168 U.S. students studied abroad for academic credit, a 7.4% increase from the previous year. Study abroad growth has slowed a bit from the previous four years of double-digit growth, but it still represents a strong increase.

The majority of U.S. students choose to study in Western Europe. Of the leading five destinations, four are in Western Europe. The United Kingdom remains the leading destination, hosting 19.6% of all U.S. study abroad, followed by Italy, Spain, and France. However, study abroad in non-traditional and non-English speaking destinations is growing in popularity. The fifth ranking destination is Mexico, with 5.4% of all U.S. study abroad. Study abroad to Mexico increased 13.4% from the previous year. Other non-traditional destinations that are represented among the leading host countries this year are Costa Rica, China, Japan, and Greece. Study abroad to the leading five destinations outside of Western Europe was 16.6% of total study abroad in 2000/01. Latin America has seen large gains, with numbers doubling since 1985/1986. Oceania's growth, from 0.9% to 6% in 2000/01, has been driven largely by study abroad to Australia.

Of the leading host countries, Australia, Italy, Greece, Spain, and Mexico saw the largest percent increases in 2000/01, all with double-digit increases. France, China, and Japan saw slight percent decreases in U.S. study abroad.

91% of U.S. students study abroad on short-term and semester-long programs.

U.S. STUDY ABROAD

Study Abroad's Impact on Higher Education

The impact of study abroad on the internationalization of U.S. higher education can be viewed in different ways. The leading study abroad institutions vary, depending on how study abroad activity is measured. Larger institutions are heavily represented if the total number of students studying abroad is considered. On the other hand, if study abroad participation rate is considered, some of the smaller institutions send a larger proportion of their students abroad.

Fields of Study

U.S. students studying abroad in 2000/01 majored in a variety of fields of study. The majority were social science (20.3%) & humanities (14.5%) majors, and while their percentage of all study abroad majors remains high, the percentage growth has remained static since 1996/97. In recent years, business & management majors (18.1%) have been going abroad in larger numbers than previously, and have seen the largest percentage increase of all the majors, now ranked second. The percentage of study abroad students who are foreign language majors (8.2%) has been dropping over the last decade.

Duration of Study

The trend towards shorter study abroad stays continued in 2000/01. Semester -length & quarter-length programs continue on a steady decline that began in 1991/92. They were the most popular length of program until 1997/98, when short-term programs surpassed them in popularity. Short-term programs of study (summer, January Term, or programs of less than 8 weeks' duration) had the largest percentage increase in 2000/01. These programs are fueling the increase in U.S. study abroad. Academic year-length programs have been on a steady decline since 1985/86.


Carnegie Category

The trend toward shorter program duration is reflected across all institutional types. The exception is Baccalaureate I & II Institutions, in which students went abroad on mainly semester-long programs. Year-long programs represent a small percentage of all study abroad across all institutional types. Associate Degree Institutions had the highest percentage of short-term programs (60%), while Other Institutions had the highest percentage of long-term programs (15.9%).




Over 47% of U.S. IEP students come from the top three places of origin, all of which are in Asia.

INTENSIVE ENGLISH


8,521 international students were enrolled in Intensive English Programs (IEPs) in the U.S. in calendar year 2001. This figure represents an 8% decrease from the previous year. The events of September 11, 2001 surely affected IEP enrollments. International students returned to their home countries, cancelled their plans to come to the U.S. and enroll in classes, or postponed their enrollment. International enrollments in IEPs were more affected by 9/11 than those of degree programs because of the flexible and ongoing nature of Intensive English Programs.

IEP students come from all regions of the world, and over half (55%) of IEP international students come from Asia. Among the leading places of origin of IEP students, five of the 17 are in Asia. Japan is the leading place of origin in both students and student-weeks, followed by Korea.


This is the third year that IIE and the boards of AAIEP and UCIEP, the leading professional associations for U.S. Intensive English Programs, have collaborated to collect comprehensive data on the IEP industry. The survey period includes international students enrolled in IEPs between January 1, 2001 and December 31, 2001. The IEP data is collected both by total headcount enrollment, as well as by student-weeks. A "student-week" represents one student studying for one week. This methodology more accurately captures the industry's impact on and unique contribution to international educational exchange.




INTERNATIONAL SCHOLARS

6,015 international scholars conducted research or taught at U.S. higher education institutions in 2001/02. The 8% increase from 2000/01 builds on the previous six years' growth in scholar flows to the U.S. International scholars are highly concentrated at large research universities in the U.S. The majority of the scholars come from Asia and Europe. While European places of origin are more heavily represented among the leading 20 places of origin, there are more scholars from Asia in total. China is the leading place of origin of international scholars, with 18.2% (15,624) of the total scholars. This is an increase of 5.8% from previous year. The Republic of Korea is second, with 8.3% (7,143) of the total. Korean scholars' presence on U.S. campuses grew by 22.5% from previous year.


The international scholars are primarily involved in research activities in their fields of specialization. The majority of scholars are conducting research in the sciences. The leading field of specialization is the health sciences (27.4%), followed by life & biological sciences (14.6%), and physical sciences (14.0%). A large number are also involved in engineering (11.4%). A small percent of scholars are involved in teaching. Scholars are mainly male (69.3%), and most hold J visas.



International student enrollments for Fall 2002 have remained level from the previous year.



With the exception of Saudi Arabia and the UAE, there have been no substantial declines in international enrollments from most Islamic and other major sending countries.



Two-thirds of institutions reported that the number of U.S. students abroad in Fall 2002 increased or remained level from last fall.

IMPACT OF SEPTEMBER 11, 2001 ON INTERNATIONAL EDUCATIONAL EXCHANGE: ONE YEAR LATER

n late October 2002, the Institute conducted an online survey through IIE Network, the Institute's membership website, in order to gauge the impact of September 11 on international educational exchange one year later. It was a follow-up to an initial online survey on this topic, sent out shortly after September 11, 2001. The survey was open to U.S. higher education institutions, including both Institute members and non-member institutions. Three hundred twenty-four educators, who identified themselves as representatives of mainly universities and four-year colleges, participated.

International Students

Respondents reported that international student enrollments appear stable and that there was no significant change in enrollments overall. Over half (57%), of the responding educators reported either increased or unchanged international enrollment in Fall 2002 compared to the same term last year. Although 42% of the respondents reported a decline, only 3% noted that it was a substantial decline (more than 30%).

Major Islamic Sending Countries

Respondents reported that they have not had substantial declines (more than 30%) in enrollments from most Islamic and other major sending countries, and that enrollments have been generally stable. Enrollments from Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates may have been impacted the most. At least 80% of respondents reported that they have not seen a substantial drop in international student enrollments from most countries. Respondents suggested in an online discussion board that visa delays or denial, financial issues, or the preference for other host countries might be contributing factors.

Study Abroad

Respondents suggested that study abroad by American students is more popular than ever in the current academic year. Over two-thirds of respondents noted that the number of students studying abroad in Fall 2002 had either continued to increase or remained level on their campus compared to the same term last year. 30% of the respondents noted that they have seen an increase in U.S. study abroad in non-traditional destinations.

All of these findings support feedback and anecdotal information from educators that the events of September 11 have raised student awareness of world affairs. American students continue to seek opportunities to study abroad, and international students are continuing to come to the United States to study despite the terrible events of September 11.

History of the Census

Since its founding in 1919, the Institute of International Education (IIE) has conducted an annual census of international students in the United States. For the first 30 years, IIE and the Committee on Friendly Relations Among Foreign Students carried out this effort jointly. IIE's first independent publication of the results of the annual census was Education for One World, containing data for the 1948/1949 academic year. It was renamed Open Doors Report on International Educational Exchange in 1954/1955, and began receiving USIA support (now Department of State) in the early 1970s. Open Doors is generally considered the primary source for basic statistics about international students, international scholars, and international students in Intensive English Programs in the United States. The response to this year's Open Doors survey (88.4% in 2001/2002) means that the survey constitutes the most comprehensive set of data on the U.S. international student population. IIE also collects baseline data on the participation of U.S. students in for-credit study abroad activity. The Study Abroad Survey is the only national source of information about the involvement of U.S. college students in for-credit study abroad programs.

Imputation

Throughout this document, student counts other than the total international student enrollments, U.S. study abroad totals, scholar totals, and IEP totals are determined by imputation. Estimates of the number of students for each of the variables collected by the various surveys are imputed from the total number of students reported. For each imputation, base or raw counts are multiplied by a correction factor that reflects the ratio of difference between the sum of the categories being imputed and the total number of students reported by institutions. It should be noted that student numbers vary slightly within this publication. Due to rounding, percentages do not always add up to 100%. This is also true for some imputations. In these instances the total percent column is listed as 100% to indicate that all categories are accounted for. The data collection methodology was designed to produce stable, national estimates of international education activity. Analysis for units that reflect relatively small numbers of students (certain nationalities, fields of study, sources of financial support) and especially those that are cut by other variables may reflect greater error variation than variables with a larger response base. A relatively large discrepancy exists between the academic level figures reported by country and those provided for all foreign students in general. This discrepancy results from the differential response rates to the nationality question and the academic level question.

Country Classification System

The classification of countries into regional groupings that is used throughout this report follows IIE practices that were originated when the Open Doors Census was first conducted in 1948. (Table 44)

Fields of Study and U.S. Regions

The fields of study used in this book are those from *Classification of Instructional Programs*, 1990, published by the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) of the U.S. Department of Education. The updated 2000 edition was used in the data editing for this year's *Open Doors*. See Table 45 for a list of major fields of study.

About the Annual Census of International Students

The Higher Education Resource Group of IIE obtained the data presented in Open Doors 2002 through a survey conducted, in Fall 2001 thru Spring 2002, of campus officials in 2,697 regionally accredited institutions of higher education in the United States. Of the institutions surveyed, 2,384 or 88.4% responded to the questionnaire, as is shown in Table 46. The response rate, although always high, has fluctuated over the history of the Census, reaching the lowest point in the mid-1970s. However, in the past decade it has been very high, ranging from 92.6% in 1979/1980 to 99.5% in 1987/1988, then dipping to 88.4% this year. This slip in response rate brings the overall response to the Census to the lowest point seen in more than 10 years. The relatively sharp fall off in response rate noted this year might reflect the cumulative effect of the demands on campus-based data providers from changes in reporting requirements coming from federal sources, including the IPEDS survey and the rollout of the new SEVIS data collection system.

Over nine-tenths (2,284) of the institutions that responded to the survey reported enrolling international students (Table 46). Of the schools with international students, a total of 422 (representing 17.7%) provided only total international student counts (Step 1), as shown in Table 47. The majority (82.3%), however, provided information not only on the total but also on the students' country of origin, field of study, academic level, sex, and other characteristics (Step 2) as well.

A high proportion of the colleges and universities with international students sent data on some or all of the characteristics on the questionnaire, as Table 48 shows. Some variables commanded a greater number of responses: data on country of origin exist for 84.9% of all international students reported, and field of study breakdowns for 82.9%. Conversely, information on the students' primary source of funding and on their marital status is available for less than half of the total number reported (40.0% and 38.3%, respectively).

About the International Scholar Survey

For the purposes of this survey, international scholars are defined as non-immigrant, non-student academics (teachers and/or researchers, administrators). Other scholars may be affiliated with U.S. institutions for other activities such as conferences, colloquia, observations, consultations, or other short-term professional development activities. The survey was limited to doctoral degree-granting institutions where most J Visa scholars are based. This year was the third year that the survey was conducted through the web and a more detailed breakout of visa categories was sought. The institutions polled were asked to give us as much information as possible on scholars who were at their institutions for part or all of the period beginning on July 1, 2001 and ending June 30, 2002. The forms requested information on the primary function of the scholars (research, teaching, both, or other), on their geographic origin, field of specialization, sex, and immigration status. Responses were received from 264 of the 348 institutions polled, a response rate of 75.9%, which is sharply off from the 81.0% obtained last year. This drop is consistent with that seen for the international student census. Not all institutions reporting international scholars in 2001/2002 were able to provide detailed information on the characteristics of their scholars. The proportion of institutions that were able to give breakdowns for individual variables ranged from 76.7% for visa status to 67.3% for field of specialization. The general drop in response rates to individual variables over the previous year seen in Table 49 may be part of the general difficulty the project has had with data collection this year.

About the U.S. Study Abroad Survey

This survey focuses on study abroad for academic credit. The study abroad population has been narrowly defined as only those students who received academic credit from a U.S. accredited institution of higher education after they returned from their study abroad experience. Students studying abroad without credit transfers are not included here nor are U.S. students enrolled overseas for degrees. The number of students who receive academic credit is inevitably lower than the number of all students who go abroad. Hence, the figures presented here give a conservative picture of study abroad activity. Study abroad information was obtained from 1,072 or 84.3% of the 1,272 surveyed institutions.

Not all institutions that reported giving credit for study abroad in 2000/2001 provided detailed information about the characteristics of the students, as shown in Table 50. The proportion of schools that gave breakdowns for individual variables ranged from 50.3% for race/ethnicity to 92.1% for program duration. The survey included an item on internships and work abroad for the third year.

About the Intensive English Program Survey

In 1999, IIE and two leading professional intensive English associations, AAIEP and UCIEP, joined to inaugurate an initiative to collect national data that reflects IEP activity in the U.S. Now in its third year, this effort to collect data with the sponsorship and support of the professional associations reflects the growth of independent and affiliated proprietary programs. Data elements included program sponsor-

ship, the percentage of students intending to continue further (non-IEP) study in the U.S., program duration (18 hours or more, 18 hours or less), and place of origin. Student totals reflect both headcount enrollment and enrollment by "studentweeks." One student-week equals one student studying for one week. This year, as last year, the number of institutions invited to participate was broadened to

include non-AAIEP and UCIEP institutions. These Intensive English Programs were taken from IIE's *Intensive English USA (IEUSA) 2000* directory. In all, 467 programs were contacted by e-mail (257 AAIEP & UCIEP programs and 210 nonmembers) and returns were obtained from 196 programs for an overall response rate of 42.0%. Responses were obtained from 148 AAIEP & UCIEP insti-

tutions, a return of 61.5%, which is up from the 57.6% response last year and comparable to the 61.5% obtained from this group two years ago. Returns were obtained from just 38 non-member programs, for an 18.1% response rate for this group. The 78,521 students reported this year reflects student enrollments throughout the 2001 calendar year (January 1, 2001 to December 31, 2001). The mix of reporting institutions reflects university and college-affiliated programs as well as large for-profit entities that offer English language training. As with our other surveys, not all programs providing total numbers could provide detailed breakouts of place of origin (98.3% of students), duration of study in student-weeks (98.5% of programs), and the percent of students pursuing further study (79.6% of programs).
