






# Supporting Adult Students in Education and the Workforce


This year, TICAS is focused on understanding how specific communities in Michigan experience the K-12 to higher education to workforce pipeline to help advocates and policymakers better support their specific needs. In partnership with the Michigan Center for Adult College Success this fact sheet focuses on Michigan's adult students and prospective students. Adult learners are adult individuals, often considered to be aged 25+, who return to education, often at the high school and undergraduate levels.







Adult learners who complete their high school diploma or equivalent and meet the income and enrollment requirements, may be eligible for the Michigan Achievement Scholarship (up to 15 months after completion) and the Tuition Incentive Program (up to 4 years after completion).









# National In School Employment Status

69%

In 2019-2020, approximately 69% of adult (25+) learners had either a full or part-time job (including fellowships) while pursuing their degrees.

**Education Impact on Workforce Earning Potential** 

### Adult (25+ yrs) students work status while enrolled

31% Not working (0 hours)

16% Part-time (<30 hours)

58% Full-time (≥ 30 hours)

Management & Leadership Positions: The share of management and top executive occupations is growing and these jobs usually require at least a bachelor's degree and sometimes an advanced degree.
