DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

A HAPPY AND SUCCESSFUL NEW YEAR TO ALL.

Yes, it is the start of a new year and a new Region 3 Director for 1996-97. While the director is new, many of the ideas and routines from previous years will continue, because they work.

Work of the 1996 Region 3 Committee has started. The first Executive Committee (ExCom) meeting will be in Memphis, February 3 and 4, 1996. You will find reports and comments from its members in this newsletter.

A BIG welcome to the 1996 Region 3 Committee and its ExCom. Elsewhere in this newsletter, you will find a listing of Region 3 ExCom members for 1996. Some of the names and faces will be familiar, but many are new. It will be the new person that gives us much of the direction from the grass roots that we need to hear and heed. The new and old will blend because it is consensus that moves us forward.

All directors come with goals or views of the future. One goal, to increase

total membership, has many subparts. The main thing needed is to improve and increase service to the members. We need to have Active Sections providing service to our members in a variety of ways. One thing is to present interesting, well advertised, regularly scheduled section/chapter programs to peak members interest.

In the field of continuing education, we have a long way to go. I am not sure our members know what is really available to them from the Educational Activities Department at Piscataway. It is possible that the Institute may need to better access member desires. We need to improve our educational contact at the section level. So you can see, the Educational Activities Chair for the region is going to be busy.

The Institute gains about 40,000 new members each year, but looses that many mainly through non-renewals. Once we get the Pink Disks, the electronic equivalent of the old pink sheets, back we will need to start working on these arrears members, urging them to become active again. To do this, we will have to present an attractive package of benefits, such as those in the IEEE Financial Advantage Program in addition to the technical programs mentioned earlier. This will require work by many at the grass roots section level.

Employment Assistance will continue to be a large part of the region's activity. Times have not radically improved. We still have members being laid off or in precarious positions. There are active plans to increase the size of the employer data base. It can be reached at "empaccess.r03@eng.uab.edu"

The Organizational Improvement you heard so much about in 1995 is still

around, but to a somewhat lesser degree. The IEEE Board of Directors did not accept either of the two final plans presented. It did vote to consider some changes to the existing organization, using some of the ideas presented during 1995. The exact status is to be determined by the 1996 Board. More information as it becomes available.

As I have said before, the Sections are the IEEE entity closest to the member.

Treasurer's Report

As a result of careful and prudent financial management of the Region 3 resources by the 1995 administration, Region 3 begins the 1996 year in sound financial condition with sufficient funds to continue to support the activities and needs of the members in the region.

At the time of this writing (mid December 1995), the final numbers for 1995 are not yet firm. However, with reasonable expectations, the forecasted summary of our financial condition is shown in the adjacent table, along with the present forecast for 1996.

1995 income exceeded the budget primarily due to favorable experience from SouthCon and SoutheastCon as well as more interest income on our Long Term Savings that expected. These items more than offset the less than expected income from the annual rebate from the Institute.

The 1995 expenses were less than budgeted due to frugal use of funds by several Committee Chairs and by less

than anticipated expenditures for several major planned projects. These savings were more than sufficient to offset significant over budget expenses for non-student travel and regional office expenses.

VIRGINIA COUNCIL

The Virginia Council has had good attendance this year with productive discussions of section problems and objectives. Emphasis continues on engineers careers due to the downsizing of companies, particularly in the defense industry of which Virginia has a large share. Taking action on this concern, the Hampton Roads Section has developed plans for a career workshop in Williamsburg on February 8. We concluded at the December council meeting that a second workshop should be held to serve the western part of the state.

The idea of a set of requirements being established for IEEE president elect was discussed and it was the consensus of the council that a record of leadership activity at the section and chapter level should be a mandatory requirement, with a strong background in the practice of engineering being highly desirable. We agreed to take this up in our respective sections. Perhaps all sections of IEEE should give this idea some consideration.

With the coordination which we have established with the Northern Virginia Section, we have started the implementation of our legislative agenda program by sending a letter to each member of the General Assembly to introduce the members of the council and provide some description of IEEE. Also, the Richmond section with the help of Northern Va. is starting the program for advanced math and science in a high school early next year. Taped lectures will be used extensively. These tapes are available to any

section interested in the program.

All sections have made a good start this fall with regular meetings. Programs included such subjects as HDTV standards, the recent advances in lasers and fiber optics, inertial navigation and global positioning, and cellular communication equipment manufacturing. From the section plans reported enthusiasm seems good and we expect the coming year to be very successful.

AREA 3 (GEORGIA)

Atlanta Section

The Atlanta Section, in partnership with AT&T, the Business & Technology Alliance (B&TA), and the Georgia Center for Advanced Telecommunications Technology (GCATT), sponsored Success in Cyberspace - All-Stars of the Information Age at Symphony Hall, Woodruff Arts Center. Hosted by AT&T Chairman/CEO Robert Allen and Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games President and CEO Billy Payne, the event gathered both the established leaders and new influentials of Cyberspace in a forum designed to foster a vigorous exchange of ideas. Participants shared insights on success in delivering the benefits of information technology and looked ahead to what skills will be needed to build on that success in Georgia's future. Success in Cyberspace - All-Stars of the Information Age was held Friday, October 20, 1995 as a part of Georgia High Tech Month. The event was broadcast throughout Georgia via the Georgia Statewide Academic and Medical Systems (GSAMS) network, the largest distance learning network in the world.

Central Georgia Section

The February Section meeting was

held on the campus of the Warner Robins Air Force Base. The program consisted of a presentation and facility tour by the staff of the Defense Megacenter, one of 16 megacenters that have consolidated from 194 original information processing centers in the United States. There are nine mid-tier computers and five mainframes, all protected by a "Tempest Shield". The total electrical service required is 2,500 kVA. The March meeting included a presentation by Lisa Tidwell, Electric Vehicle Research Center Coordinator for Georgia Power in Atlanta. Her topic was Electric Transportation at Georgia Power. The featured speaker for the April meeting was David Priester of TRW. He lectured and showed a video tape on ethics. The discussion was lively and highlighted the fact that all ethical issues are not black and white. A demonstration of the vehicle designed by two Mercer IEEE students, Matt Hortman and Thor Johnson, for the IEEE SoutheastCon student competition was also provided. This project was one of the student projects partially supported by the Section. Wayne Ingram was the speaker for the May meeting. He is a Senior Hardware and Lead Engineer for Ball Systems Inc. located in Warner Robins, GA. His topic was on the redesign and fabrication of hybrid circuits in F-15 radar system that have obsolete parts. The June Section meeting featured two speakers, Al Richardson and D. Keith Mills. Their topic was Statistical Process Control in the Workplace. They used The Engelhard Corporation, a kaolin producer, as an example of how statistical process control is used in their day to day operations and how it is used to accomplish a high quality product. John Schaefer, an electrical engineering faculty member at Mercer and the main advisor for Mercer's entry into the Solar Powered Car Race 1995, was the featured speaker. He discussed terrestrial photovoltaic systems, as well as giving an endof-race summary into how the Mercer Team did in the competition. Mercer's car finished 28 out of 38 cars. Mercer's



solar car was also partially funded by the Central GA IEEE Section. The September meeting was held at the site of Gegelec Automation located near the Macon Municipal Airport. Locally, Gegelec produces AC and DC motor drives for large (greater than 1000 hp) motors. Attendees had an overview of the company and their product as well as a tour of the manufacturing facilities. The October meeting's featured speaker was Philip Olivier, an electrical engineering faculty member at Mercer. His presentation was on fuzzy logic controllers and some of the available fuzzy logic tools. A software demonstration of backing up a truck to a loading dock was given. Johnny Jones from Southern Bell give the presentation at the November meeting. His topic was optical fiber to the home. The current status and the near-term plans for the Macon area were discussed.

Savannah Section

The section sponsored two half-day seminars on the Internet. The June seminar was attended by about 50 people. The other was held in October in conjunction with the National Association of Technology Educators Annual Convention in Savannah. Slowly the membership is getting connected electronically. Section is trying to spread the meetings around geographically between Savannah, Hilton Head Island and Statesboro. One of the Section's biggest challenges continues to be attendance at the meetings which averages between 15 and 20 members. The Savannah Section would like to create a presence on the World Wide Web but do not have access to an inexpensive server. If this type project is something that Region 3 could support and coordinate, the Section would maintain the home page. It would be helpful if other sections that have addressed these issues/problems could share their expertise. The greatest challenge is getting the membership involved in the Activities of the Institute that can and do have a profound influence both on the technology and individual careers.



Tennessee Council

It is both a pleasure and honor to assume the duties of Area 6 Chair, and I look forward to working with the Sections and Subsections in Area 6, as well as the Region 3 administration. This Newsletter column serves as an outlet for reporting recent developments in Area 6, and invites outside contact with Area 6 officers for the purpose of sharing experiences and expertise. With the recent departures of Baton Rouge and New Orleans from Region 3, Area 6 now has four Sections - Alabama, Huntsville, Mississippi, and Mobile - and two Subsections - Montgomery and Northeast Mississippi.

Attendance and activity in the Alabama Section remains high. Chairman Darrel Piatt (205-250-4222) was one of two featured speakers at an October S-PAC conducted by the Auburn University student branch. The S-PAC was attended by approximately 100 students. IEEE President Wallace Read addressed an audience of 80 members and spouses at the December meeting of the Alabama Section in Birmingham. The Montgomery Subsection (Chair Jim Tomlin, phone 334-416-1416) is grappling with the difficult task of meeting attendance improvement, and Jim would welcome any constructive suggestions.

Donna Jean Barker (205-726-1945), Huntsville Section Chair, projects an attendance of approximately 25,000 at the IEEE Computer Fair scheduled for February 2-3, 1996. You are invited to Huntsville for this major Section event. Also, the Huntsville Section is co-sponsor (with UAH and others) of the Information Currents '96 convention, upcoming June 3-5, 1996. After their September kickoff meeting, Mobile Section Chair Alex Abraham (334-470-4000) reports an average attendance of 40 for the October and November technical program meetings which, respectively, featured speakers from International Paper and QMS Products & Technology.

In addition to Jackson meetings, the Mississippi Section went on the road to Starkville for a joint meeting with the Northeast Mississippi Subsection in October. Chair Lisa Secrest (601-961-3362) reports that the Section has completed a major update of the Section Bylaws, and that the 10% rebate bonus for early report filing with IEEE HQ is an effective incentive! The Northeast Mississippi Subsection (Chair John Simpson, 601-325-2184) has found plant trips to local industries to be an effective activity, and has made

three trips during the past year. Also, the Subsection actively supports the Mississippi State University student branch through two joint meetings annually.

Several points of concern were raised by Section/Subsection officers as they were canvassed to prepare this report. More details of these issues will appear in future Newsletter installments, as space permits.

It Ain't Over Yet

Just when we think that the trend of unemployment for our members has bottomed out, and we start believing the propaganda put out by Washington and the media about how robust the economy is, we suddenly are brought back to reality by those little announcements that "it ain't over yet". Announcements like: restructuring, downsizing, plant closings, buy-out, and layoffs at many of our major providers of power, communication, computers, and software make it hard to believe that things have improved that much for our members. Regardless of the terminology used, loss of employment is painful and to some, devastating.

About two years ago, Region 3 decided that it would do more than give lip service in providing help to those members seeking employment. As I become the first past Chairman of the Region 3 Professional Activities Operation (PAO) - Employment Assistance Subcommittee, I find it difficult to move on without saying a few words about what

Region 3 has done to help our members find employment. Two major accomplishment come to mind: the Electro-Technology Industry database (ETI dB) and the Region 3 Bulletin Board System (BBB). These two projects have made Region 3 the national leader of employment assistance services offered to the membership within IEEE. I compliment Deb Powers, Vernon Powers, Lee Stogner, Dave Green and the many others who have worked so hard to make these projects succeed and become a reality. In spite of continued unemployment, I am proud to have been a part of an entity that has taken such an active role in providing employment assistance its members. As I assume the duties of the Professional Activities Operation Committee (PAO), Chairman, one of my goals will be to keep these and other employment assistance initiatives alive, well, and ongoing.

As I understand the role of the PAO Committee, it is to assist the Region in planning, organizing, implementing, and monitoring Professional Activities, to coordinate with IEEE-USA, and to assist the Region in implementing IEEE-USA programs and policies. David Bower will become the PAO Awards and Recognition Chairman and will be working with the Region 3 and USAB Awards and Recognition Committees to find and recommend deserving candidates for the professional activities awards. Charles Lord will become the PAO Career Activities Chairman and will be our principal channel with the USAB Career Policy Council. Hopefully, by the time you read this article, the remaining committee positions we will be staffed by able and hard working members who will join with me in making all of those words in the POAC charter become accomplishments.


Nominations and Appointments

The basis for the BBS is to make information available to those of our members who have a computer and a modem, but not necessarily email or internet access. Region 3 has a toll free number (1-800-555-REG3) for those members living within (area code 404 use 770-446-0740, area code 770 use 446-0740) Region 3, and members from outside the region are welcome to access it at 770-446-0740. We have had members call from all states within Region 3, as well as some calls from Connecticut, New Mexico and from as far away as Iran!

The BBS includes Institute and Region information, as well as having menu space for Region 3 entities (areas/councils, sections, chapters, student branches, etc.) to post information. The text of many of the Institute publications are available (awards manuals, newsletters, bulletins, alerts, etc.), and information sent out by IEEE-USA/USAB via email is posted there, also.

Region 3 Expands ETI Database

In an effort to enhance employment services to Region 3 members who may have to seek employment outside of Region 3, the ETI Database which was previously limited to electro-technology companies within the geographic boundaries of Region 3 (Southeast) has been expanded to select states outside Region 3. The University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB) Student Branch has taken the lead in up loading 2 high-tech employer databases, adding approximately 6,000 more companies to the current database of approximately 35,000. The addition of the Southwest and Central U.S. regions gives the Region 3 ETI Dtabase approximately 50% coverage of the United States. The database up-dating and expansion activity is part of the Region 3 Special Project, ETI Database Phase 3 which was funded in January of 1995 and intended to be a recurring Region activity. The recurring activity for 1996 is covered under Phase 4 of the Special Project.

ETI Database is Accessable to all IEEE Student Branch Members

To promote IEEE student membership and retention of student members, the ETI Database is available to all IEEE Student Branch members. The Region 3 Special Project, under the lead of the UAB Student Branch currently uses manual intervention but the IEEE's Student Membership Database will be incorporated when available. All IEEE Student Branches are encouraged to publicize the employment service to their membership and non-members. Past Director Deborah Powers notified all Student Branches in December of system availability and provided instructions on how to access the database.

NEW RABFACTS FAX-ON-DEMAND SERVICE AVAILABLE-GIVE IT A TRY!
