IEEE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

7 June 1983

1. A large assortment of photos from the SOUTHEASTCON conference have been provided for the Section Notes editor to use in the Notes, including photos of the awards luncheon presentations. The receipt of the Exemplary Section award for the Orlando Section is included. This was the first such award ever made by Region 3; the second award made during the same luncheon went to the Birmingham section.

The framed certificate is currently in the possession of George McClure.

- 2. The Florida Council's annual Officer Training Workshop will be held Saturday at the Sheraton International Airport Inn, starting at 9:00 AM. All officers and others interested are invited to attend.
- 3. The President of the IEEE Instrumentation and Measurement Society has indicated a desire to consider holding their 1986 international conference in Orlando, if the section is willing to act as host and handle the local arrangements. The technical program responsibility is retained by the Society, and will not be delegated to the section.
- 4. The President of the IEEE Professional Communication Society has responded to our inquiry about hosting their annual conference. The 1983 conference will be held in Atlanta in October, and we will get a better idea of the size and scope from that one, since Glenda McClure has been accepted to present a paper there. The PCS hopes to have a west coast site in the next year or two, to reduce the travel cost for west coast members, but is waiting for a section or group to volunteer there. We may want to submit a proposal to hold it in Orlando in 1985. The low air fares to Orlando from most cities in the U.S. is an attraction to hold a conference here. Again, this is a local arrangements hosting function, with the Society working its own technical program.
- 5. The Vehicular Technology Society is interested in coming back to Orlando for an annual conference sometime after 1985. The Miami section may be interested in hosting that one, after their success with the Communications Society's GLOBECOM last year. The VT conference for 1983 was held last month in Toronto, and the next one will be in Pittsburgh, with Westinghouse supporting it strongly.

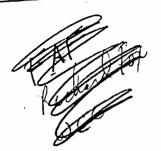

REPORT ON PACE CONFERENCE September 2-5, 1983 Phoenix, Arizona 9-6-83 July

IEEE's work in four Councils was described: Member Activities Council, Career Activities Council, Government Activities Council, and Technical Activities Council. Issues active now include age discrimination, pre-patent invention rights, restrictions on employment in the U.S. of the alien engineer, and portable pensions. The Third Careers Conference will be held in Palo Alto on October 27-28. A Career Strengthening Workshop will also be presented there (\$35 fee) and is available for use elsewhere under section sponsorship.

The following resolutions were considered at the Conference:

- A Task Force should be established to aid the engineer who wants to operate as a small business, by trying to set aside separate defense budget line items for small business and by simplifying the award and contracting procedures for small businesses. Steve Honickman proposed this and it passed, about 65:4.
- Since USAB deals with U.S. engineers' concerns, and the IEEE Board of Directors deals with international engineers' concerns, no actions of USAB should be overruled by the IEEE Board of Directors or other instrumentalities of the Institute. Passed, 45 for; 25 against
- The chairman of USAB should be selected from among those with demonstrated USAB or PACE experience. Passed, 70 for; 7 against
- Members at large of USAB shall be selected from members with prior USAB or PACE experience. Passed, 71 for, 7 against
- The IEEE should drop out of the American Association of Engineering Societies when its present financial commitment has expired. Passed, 57 for; 7 opposed; 11 abstained
- The IEEE should lead in the formation of a new umbrella society with the 5

 AAES founder societies (IEEE, ASME, AICHE, Civil, and Mining). Passed, 63 for;
 6 opposed; 11 abstained

A full report on the conference will be mailed out to Section Chairmen shortly by the IEEE Washington Office. The results of the latest member opinion survey will also be out shortly.

The PAC formation by IEEE is a dead issue, unless there is a grass-roots demand for it from the sections. While NSPE has one, a Boston PACE chairman said when a member of NSPE he disagreed on how the PAC money was spent, and dropped out of NSPE as a result.

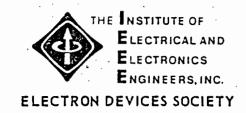

REPORT ON PACE CONFERENCE September 2-5, 1983 Phoenix, Arizona 9-6-83 JXV

IEEE's work in four Councils was described: Member Activities Council, Career Activities Council, Government Activities Council, and Technical Activities Council. Issues active now include age discrimination, pre-patent invention rights, restrictions on employment in the U.S. of the alien engineer, and portable pensions. The Third Careers Conference will be held in Palo Alto on October 27-28. A Career Strengthening Workshop will also be presented there (\$35 fee) and is available for use elsewhere under section sponsorship. The following resolutions were considered at the Conference:

- A Task Force should be established to aid the engineer who wants to operate as a small business, by trying to set aside separate defense budget line items for small business and by simplifying the award and contracting procedures for small businesses. Steve Honickman proposed this and it passed, about 65:4.
- Since USAB deals with U.S. engineers' concerns, and the IEEE Board of Directors deals with international engineers' concerns, no actions of USAB should be overruled by the IEEE Board of Directors or other instrumentalities of the Institute. Passed, 45 for; 25 against
- The chairman of USAB should be selected from among those with demonstrated
 USAB or PACE experience. Passed, 70 for; 7 against
- Members at large of USAB shall be selected from members with prior USAB or PACE experience. Passed, 71 for, 7 against
- The IEEE should drop out of the American Association of Engineering Societies

 when its present financial commitment has expired. Passed, 57 for; 7 opposed;

 11 abstained
- The IEEE should lead in the formation of a new umbrella society with the 5
 AAES founder societies (IEEE, ASME, AICHE, Civil, and Mining). Passed, 63 for;
 6 opposed; 11 abstained

A full report on the conference will be mailed out to Section Chairmen shortly by the IEEE Washington Office. The results of the latest member opinion survey will also be out shortly.

The PAC formation by IEEE is a dead issue, unless there is a grass-roots demand for it from the sections. While NSPE has one, a Boston PACE chairman said when a member of NSPE he disagreed on how the PAC money was spent, and dropped out of NSPE as a result.

USAB Position Statements Approved, Committee to Study Policy on Positions

The June 7-8 meeting of USAB, the following Position Statements were approved:

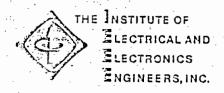

A motion was made to add the Sections blessing to a short course in Robot Sencing and Intelligence to be put on by UCF. UCF would be responsible for all aspects of the course including the financing. The section would receive no profits since we were only lending the IEEE name to the project. John Gilbert made the motion. It was seconded by Bill Cram. Motion carried.

Currently a short course in Digital Signal Processing for the Naval Training Center is being conducted.

Dr. Simons is to bring in information about future short courses that may be held under sponsorship of the Section.

13. Membership Development - Deen Khandelwal:

There has been six new members join IEEE since the last report with twenty members moving into the section area. A letter has been sent to those members who are eligible to apply for upgrading their membership to senior member grade. A detail list is attached.

The section has currently a little less than 900 members. If you sponsor a new member, a certificate will be given by IEEE headquarters that may be used to select certain merchandise. To receive the certificate, the sponsor has to send the application for the new member into headquarters.

The section currently has 100 senior members, 20 life senior members, 3 follows, and about a dozen life fellows.

There is avaiable a copy of each society's membership for the chapter chairmen to use. A copy can be obtained from the secretary. A list of the societies represented in the Orlando section along with a membership count is attached to the minutes.

The SOUTHEASTCON treasurer, Joe Massett, has a check for \$2,227.98 for reimbursement of the \$2,500.00 advance money from the Orlando section.

The loss was caused by not enough paid attendies. Since very few of the attendies stayed at the hotel which was reserved for the week, the hotel charged \$11,000.00 in penalties. Councilors for 150 students ask for their money back because they felt the students did not receive their moneys worth. This was after having to pay for 250 student meals where they did not show. The meal cost was greater than the student registration fee. The councilors were told the students received their moneys worth.

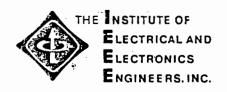

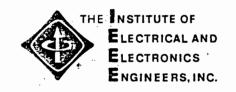

- 3. SOUTHEASTCON *83 has sold 6 exhibit booths thus far, with additional inquiries being received regularly. Raytheon has not signed up yet, but says the are planning to exhibit the Patriot missile system. Martin Marietta has declined to participate as an exhibitor. A second mailing to the 400-name address list is in preparation.
- 4. The Florida Revenue Commission has been contacted about qualifying for exemption from the Florida Sales Tax, as a non-profit educational organization. A copy of the application has been supplied to Don Mendorf for the Section, and the matter will be taken up with the Florida Council, since all twelve Sections in Florida can be treated the same. The application requires information about the tax status of the parent organization, so would require cooperation from Hq. to complete. Sales of goods, such as coffee cups, to the members would require the collection and transmittal of sales tax, even if other items, such as the printing of our Section Notes were tax exempt.
- 5. The first edition of the Florida Council Newsletter has been sent to all Florida Sections (chairman, vice-chairman, PACE chairmen, and newsletter editors) by the FCIEEE newsletter editor and FCIEEE Vice Chairman, George McClure. The Newsletter will be published quarterly to keep Florida Sections* leadership informed of actions and deliberations by the FCIEEE.
- 6. One proposal raised at the FCIII meeting in December was the establishment of a PAC (Political Action Committee) to influence legislation by contributing to election funds for candidates. A problem exists if this could be considered as lobbying, since that is not allowed for tax-exempt organizations; no contributions to qualified candidates for political office can be deducted as a 50% rate up to a deduction of \$100 (single) or \$200 (joint return).

16B. Russell E. Theisen has won the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE) "1983 OUTSTANDING SERVICE AWARD".

This annual Regional award is made to the individual selected from the 25,000 IEEE members in Region 3 who has made the most significant contribution to IEEE and the Engineering Community.

Mr. Theisen is in the Martin Marietta Systems Software Department and is responsible for the ADATS Engineering test systems development.

For IEEE he has held over 35 offices at the local, state, region, and national levels. Presently, he is the Computer Society's National representative on Membership and Chapter development and the General Chairman of the SOUTHEASTCON '83 conference to be held April 11 through 13, 1983 in Orlando, Florida. He also is the STANDING COMMITTEE Chairman for TUTORIAL WEEK EAST, the annual week long technical seminar held in Orlando the first week of April. Mr. Theisen is listed in "WHO'S WHO in America" and "WHO'S WHO in the South" 1982, 1983.

The subject will be the robotics industry with the principle speaker being the Honorable D. Bruce Merrifield, Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Productivity, Technology and Innovation speaking on "R&D Limited Partnerships". The Honorable Don Fuqua will discuss "Robotics Legislation" at the luncheon.

The next Electron Device Society meeting has not been setup at this time.

23. AP/MTT - Fred Wilcox:

Chairman's Report - Ed Ellis:

4. The Chairman reported that he had requested a free copy of the Salary Survey volume from IEEE headquarters. It was recommended to donate the book to the Orlando Public Library as a reference book not to be removed from the library.

Ed also discussed the Dividend program is Seminole County.

5a. Programs - George Taack:

The Engineer's week banquet was held on Saturday, February 18, 1984 at the Errol Estate Country Club in Apopka. The speaker was Ms. Carole Nelson of Channel 6 TV. Her topic of "Can You Fit The 80's" was well presented and enjoyable. Including the nominees and fellows, there were 65 in attendance with 9 no-shows (6 paid for their meals the following week). When the cost of the awards and trophies were figured into the cost, the expenditures were \$96.39 over the actual plus budgeted income. The total cost to the section including trophies was \$954.94. Attached is a detailed report covering the banquet finances.

5b. Centennial Activities - Deen Khandelwal:

George McClure reported for Deen Khandelwal on the Centennial activities. A meeting of the Centennial Activities Committee was held on March 2, 1984. In attendance were Deen Khandelwal, Dave Flinchbaugh, John Gilbert, and George McClure. Some of the ideas generated were as follows:

- o Have the month of October designated as IEEE Centennial month by the Mayor of Orlando and recommend to the Florida Council to have the Governor do the same at the state level.
- o Schedule a number of activities during October. See the attached report for more detail.
- o Produce a special edition of the Orlando Section Notes (In the process of being developed). See the attached report for detail of contents. A special effort should be made to obtain more advertisers for the issue.
 - o Encourage all members to purchase at least one Centennial memento.
 - O Arrange for a showcase to be placed at the Orlando Public Library and the Orlando Science Center.
 - o Donate to the Orlando Public Library (1) a time-line poster (\$3.00), (2) the two books published to celebrate the centennial (\$41.90), (3) an issue of IEEE Standard Dictionary of Electrical and Electronic Terms (\$37.50), and

(4) a complete set of IEEE standards (list at - \$2225.00 but only cost \$1225.00).

o Other ideas are listed in the attached report.

The committee submitted a proposed budget for the current year of \$6200.00. This was reduced to \$3800.00.

All members of the executive committee are invited to attend a meeting with Deen Khandelwal and the life members on March 14, 1984 at 5:00 p.m. in the Directors conference room of the Stromburg-Carlson Engineering Development Center. The EDC is located 1 mile north of 434 on 17-92 in Longwood.

6. Public Relations - George McClure:

Sections will have to arrange for an earth station to receive the ceremony if they wish to watch it.

Attached is a report on a telephone conversation with Dallas Maddron, Science Consultant, Orange County Public Schools on possible involvement with the school system. Betty Palmer is the Science Coordinator with the Seminole County Public Schools.

- 2. Releases were supplied to the Orlando Sentinel on the Awards banquet, the Computer Society talk on software productivity, and the high-technology robotics seminar coming up. A separate release, featuring the photograph and story on our engineer of the year, Don Malocha, has been sent to the Sentinel.

- 4. IEEE Hq. Public Relations staff director, Tom White, was asked about any plans to feed the satellite broadcast of the Centennial Convocation to Public Broadcasting TV stations or to cable operators' public access channels. It was TAB's idea to have this ceremony available to any section who wanted to plan a meeting to watch it, and could arrange for an earth station to receive it. The Atlanta section apparently is doing this.
- 5. Telecon with Dallas Maddron, Science Consultant, Orange County Public Schools

A joint Engineering Club has been established with 150 members among the ten high schools in Orange County. Students in private and parochial schools may also be admitted. Maddron has a mailing list for all members, with their home addresses, keeping the parents posted on activities as well.

The first meeting was at the John Young Science Center, assisted by UCF; 75 members attended. The second meeting featured a talk by NASA representatives on the space shuttle, and was followed by a trip to the KSC to view a launch from the VIP stands; 55 went. The third meeting was at UCF in connecting with the recent visitation of high school students for Engineering Day.

On March 8, a "Physics Olympics" is scheduled. 24 members took the National Engineering Societies' apitude test for engineering, including 6 girls and 6 Korean/Vietnamese.

IEEE could co-sponsor with AIAA a day at Martin Marietta for students, that has been organized by Tina Wang and Tom Gagnier.

IEEE could assist in teaching soldering to members who want to work on the solar cell projects in the contest sponsored by the Photovoltaic Conference, to be here in May. Each high school has received 500 photocells and \$150 for other materials as a gift, to be used on the contest projects. First prize is \$750, second prize is \$500. Art Litka, a UCF professor formerly at the Solar Energy Center is visiting today at 2:00 PM to assist in project definition.

IEEE could provide "godfathers", especially for minority students, who have no first hand knowledge of what engineering is like, since they don't know any engineers.

For potential women engineers, UCF is holding a "Women in Science" day, on April 22.

Maddron would like resources who could provide demonstrations to student groups, showing operation of equipment, e.g., lasers, or just samples of hardware, e.g., color codes.

Listing are sought for a Speaker's Bureau, that would be updated annually.

Resources are needed-for repairs of equipment, such as the "Spec-20" and \$1700 autoclaves; expertise is not available to isolate and diagnose faults now.

Several programs are in being for students with science/engineering interests:

- 1. Summer Program at KSC 14 student volunteers (10 minority and 4 gifted) spent all summer at Kennedy Space Center working on projects of interest. Transportation was provided; cost was \$1000.
- 2. "Work with a Scientist" program at Martin Marietta 9 to 14 people hold summer jobs for 6-10 weeks, being paid minimum wage. These are usually high school seniors, but exceptional juniors may be included. Students should have own transportation. The company sponsorship is written off as an educational grant, but some useful work is returned to the sponsor. Maddron would like to expand this program to other companies having suitable work available, e.g., GE robotics, Westinghouse, and others. It has been shown that students first attracted to a company in this way are prime candidates for later employment by that firm after college; both student and company have an opportunity to evaluate each other.
- 3. Executive Internship Program An apprenticeship for high school seniors providing 3 credits toward high school graduation. They do resumes, keep logs on their work, perform generally as professionals. For 4 days a week they go to the company; on Fridays they return to school and relate what they have been doing. Duration is 4.5 months, equivalent to a semester.

Seminole County has a science coordinator also (a woman), but Maddron thinks we should work first with Orange County to refine our effort before branching out.

- 2. Letters have been written to all life members in the Orlando section (66) requesting them to participate in the centenial celebration in a special way. A sample copy of the letter is available.
- 3. A meeting of the Centenial Activities Committee, Deen Khandelwal, Dave Flinchbaugh, John Gilbert, and George McClure (Russ Theisen was on Travel), was held on March 2, 1984 and the following ideas were generated:
 - a) Declare the month of October as the IEEE Centenial Celebration month in the Orlando section. The activities during this period may include a day of festivities with Dr. John D. Ryder, Chairman, IEEE Centenial Task Force, as the keynote speaker, a slide show, a High School Essay Contest announcement of winner, History presentations, etc.; Centenial convocation on October 8, 1984; Exhibitions of past present and future in Orlando Public Library and Orlando Science Center; Open hours in the various local companies, etc.
 - b) A special edition of Orlando Section Notes should be published in the month of September. 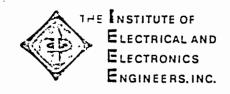

Subject: Southcon 1984 Registration Committee Report

This is the final Southcon Registration Committee report from the Vice-Chairman 1984.

Over all the registration was handled in a professional manner and went very smoothly. The committee consisted of Orlando area E.R.A. & I.E.E.E. volunteers that guided and manned the registration during the three (3) day conference.

It took over 42 volunteer committee members to handle the joint Mini Micro and Southcon registration. This included approximately 6 registration committee members for each of the 1/2 day shifts (First shift, 8:00 a.m. to noon and Second shift, noon to 5:00 p.m.) for both of the last two (2) days. Three additional volunteers per shift were required for the first day registration because of the large registration activities.

Even though some 9,000 pre-regsitered an additional 6,000 registered at the conference. Approximately 3,000 during the first day; 2,500 the second day and 500 the third day.

The first day was the most demanding with 9 committee representatives needed to handle the joint conference registrations distributed as follows:

We suggest that in the future we could improve the conference if the following items are corrected:

- 1. The Badging lines should be proportioned so that 7/8 of the registration area be devoted to Southcon registration and 1/8 be devoted to Mini Micro registration and all of the V.I.P., press, and extra badging functions.

 It took some 35 seconds to process each attendee badge on each machine. There were 8 machines in operation but we had over 350 people waiting in line to be badged at two peek times on the first day 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 to 3:00 p.m..
- 2. The placement of the registration desk should be changed to be the first thing that an attendee sees on entering the convention center instead of the proceedings book sales booth that was placed at the enterance to the hall.
- 3. Information signs and diagrams were missing. Most of the conventions use "You are here" Diagrams to locate the registration area, exhibitors registration, preregistration, cashier, badging, restrooms, press room, movie studio, exhibitors lounge, speakers lounge, etc. Color tape on the rugs or floor could be used to direct the people through registration, especially since the registration machines were hidden from view.
- 4. There were not enough final programs printed to cover the demand from the paid registrations on the last day. We should at least retain enough for the paid registrations the last day.
- 5. There was a shortage of jackets for the Thursday (last day) registration committee members. We should have better security next time to minimize pilferage.
- 6. There should be several backup registration committee people on call to cover for those who do not show up at their assigned times. We used 4 back up people during the 3 days.
- 7. There should be at least two (2) registration committee meetings to familiarize the registration committee with the facility. The busy schedules of the volunteers sometimes prohibit the attendance of the single all committee meeting offered by Electronic Convention Inc. the day before the conference.

- 8. The registration committee should be provided parking & meals at less than conference rates especially when they serve double shift service. It is a bit to much to expect the volunteers to:
 - O Donate his time free
 - O Buy his own meals at convention prices
 - O Pay for parking or transportation
 - 0 . Attend organizational meetings
 - O Not access to the V.I. P. lounge or Equivalent coffee break area
- 9. The Registration lobby should have area map to show:
 - c Facility meeting locations
 - o Restroom and eating areas
 - c Local area map for lunch & dinner selection.
- 10. The movie theatre was standing room only for most of the afternoon sessions. We could use a larger facility next time.
- 11. The paid convention personnel should be commended for their professional handling of the registration matters. They did an outstanding job in pre-registration, cashier, badging and operational matters. We have nothing but praise for these people.
- 12. The convention facility was filled to capacity with the exhibits. If we expand the exhibits to 700 or 800 in 1986 we will not be able to handle the Southcon within the existing Orange County Convention facilities. We may have to split the convention if this is not corrected before next time.
- 13. Transportation between hotels was not well coordinated. The bus drivers did not all know what they were supposed to do. The Days Inn and Rodeway Inn were skipped in the mornings pick-up both Wednesday and Thursday. I had suggested that the registration committee park at one of the local hotels and catch the bus to the convention facility. Only the Sheraton Twin Towers and Sheraton World were used in the mornings according to five of the committee who tried this. We also received complaints that the busses were not picking up at the designated pickup signs at the Marriott and Sheraton Hotels on Thursday afternoon (Jan. 19, 1984).
- 14. The Super Bowl Weekend kept much of the publicity media away from the conference. We need to get more TV coverage than we did this year. We have found contests between robots seem to always draw the media coverage to conferences. Maybe we can use this gimmic in our advertising to help get coverage.
- 15. Several attendees complained of allowing smoking in the aisles even though no smoking signs were displayed. Also the technical sessions did not seem to enforce no smoking or

separating the two seating groups into smoking and nonsmoking sections.

- 16. I talked to several exhibitors and they said that this was the best Southcon yet. We had both quality and quantity of attendees. The security was the best of any conference at which Tektronix and others had exhibited at any time in the past.
- 17. Exhibitor complaints were generally as follows:
 - Humps in the aisles caused people to stumble over power cords under the rugs.
 - c Exhibitors were not aware of the camera passes that would allow them to photograph their exhibits.
 - c Crowds of a few exhibitors who had shows blocked the aisles and impeded traffic flows.
 - Signs and booth decorations were not of the quality expected by several exhibitors.
 - o Hospitality suits were not in close proximity to the convention floor for conducting business.

Congratulations to you, Stewart, and all the Directors for your guidance and direction. The attendance committee did an excellent job of pre-registration. This made the registration committee's job much easier. I was proud to be a part of Southcon 1984.

BYLAWS OF THE ORLANDO SECTION, IEEE

010 Section Name

This organization shall be known as the Orlando Section of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers.

020 Section Territory

The Orlando Section shall be composed of IEEE members whose IEEE mailing addresses are within the following counties, all in the State of Florida:

- 021 Orange County
- 022 Osceola County
- 023 Seminole County
- 024 Lake County
- 025 Sumter County

030 Section Officers

031 Elected Officers and Duties

The following Officers shall be elected by the general membership of the Section.

O31.1 Chairman - The Section Chairman, responsible to the Executive Committee, is the executive officer of the Section and has general supervision of the affairs of the Section. One of his chief duties is to act as Chairman of the Section Executive Committee, to hold regular meetings of that Committee and see that, by action of that Committee, the affairs of the Section are handled properly and in the best interests of IEEE.

031.2 Vice Chairman - The Vice Chairman will automatically become the

chairman when a vacancy in the Chairman's Office is created by any situation. The Vice Chairman shall perform the duties of the Chairman in the conduct of the Section and the Executive Committee whenever the Chairman is unable to attend or participate in those activities. He shall acquire, compile, and distribute material relevant to the duties of each office (elected and appointed) as presented in the IEEE Section Manual and augmented by Orlando Section Bylaws. The Vice Chairman shall also serve as a member of the Finance Committee.

031.3 Secretary - The Secretary shall record and distribute the minutes of all Section and Executive Committee meetings. He is also responsible for summarizing all of the meeting activities of the Section and Group/Society Chapters for the calendar year, submitting this annual report so that it complies with IEEE Headquarters rebate deadline dates.

031.4 Treasurer - The Treasurer shall serve as Chairman of the Section Finance Committee which shall include the Junior Past Chairman and the Vice-Chairman. He shall assist the Section Chairman in preparing a Section Budget, which shall be presented no later than the August Section Executive Committee Meeting for approval. He is then responsible for managing that budget by recording the income and expenditures in relation to the Budget. Any overrun of the Budget shall be immediately brought to the attention of the Section Executive Committee.

032 Qualification for Elected Officers

All Elected Officers must be members of the Orlando Section at the time of nomination and must maintain an active membership status throughout the term of office.

- 032.1 Chairman Nominees for Chairman must have served a minimum of 1.5 years on the Section Executive Committee at the time of nomination.
- 032.2 Vice Chairman Nominees must have completed 0.5 year service on the Executive Committee at the time of nomination.
- 032.3 Secretary Nominees must have completed 0.5 year service on the Executive Committee at the time of nomination.
- 032.4 Treasurer Nominees must have completed 0.5 year service on the Executive Committee at the time of nomination.
 - 033 Appointed Officers and Duties

The Section Chairman shall appoint chairmen for each of the following standing committees and shall appoint special committees as required.

033.1 Standing Committees

- 033.1.1 Program Committee This Committee shall provide the programs and speakers for Section meetings as directed by the Section Chairman and the Executive Committee. This committee shall also prepare a schedule (calendar of all Section and Group/Society Chapter meetings) acting as the focal point for the coordination of all meetings to minimize conflicting meeting dates.
- 033.1.2 Membership and Development Committee This Committee shall maintain an updated list of all members in the Section and is responsible for bringing the advantages of IEEE membership to the attention of potential members within the Orlando Section territory. This Committee is also responsible for encouraging transfers to highest grades for which existing members are qualified. In carrying out these duties, this committee shall maintain and distribute an adequate supply of related literature and

applications issued by IEEE Headquarters for the purpose of membership and transfers, and shall distribute and collect the attendance cards at each Section meeting.

033.1.3 Publicity Committee - This Committee shall be responsible for properly advertising meetings of the Section and for all local publicity on IEEE matters, including releases to the press on IEEE Awards and appointments made to Section members.

033.1.4 Facilities and Arrangements Committee - This Committee is responsible for fulfilling all facility and arrangement requirements of Section meetings. In addition, this committee shall maintain an up-to-date listing of meeting places suitable for Section and Group/Society Chapter meetings. This listing should include information on meeting rooms, capacity, dinner options, contacts, etc.

033.1.5 Publication Committee - This committee is responsible for publishing and distributing the Orlando Section Notes. In this capacity, this committee shall seek and acquire suitable paid advertisements for the Notes in order to minimize the Section costs for their publication. This committee is also responsible for the maintenance and control of the Orlando Section Non-Profit Organization Mailing Permit.

033.1.6 Awards Committee - This committee shall acquaint themselves with all IEEE and other related awards taking appropriate action for the active participation of the Section in recommending deserving candidates for those awards. In addition, this committee shall establish an on going Awards Program to recognize technical excellence and IEEE service within the Orlando Section.

033.1.7 Florida Engineering Society (FES) Liaison Committee

This Committee is responsible for maintaining close contact and liaison with FES for the joint purpose of enhancing the professional status of engineers.

033.1.8 Professional Activities Committee (PAC) - This Committee shall promote and implement those objectives which reflect the professional principles covered in the IEEE Constitution. This Committee shall also be guided by the policies and directives of the National and Region III PAC's.

033.1.9 Student Activities Committee - This Committee shall include all IEEE Student Branch Counselors within the territory of the Orlando Section.

This Committee is responsible for establishing Section cooperation with the Student Branches and supporting Student activities within the Section and Region.

033.1.10 Finance Committee - This Committee will be responsible for reviewing the financial affairs of the Section and take initiative for making recommendations to the Executive Committee when warranted. It shall review the annual budget in advance of its submission to the Executive Committee.

033.1.11 Other Committees — as necessary to accomplish defined activities that require functioning of the Committee on a continuing or "year—around" basis.

033.2 Special Committees

O33.2.1 Nominating Committee - This Committee shall select from the Section membership candidates qualified for the elective offices of the Section: Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer. The Committee shall determine that each nominee is eligible and willing to accept the responsibilities of the office, if elected. This Committee shall be comprised

of at least three (3) members (not currently seeking an elected office) who are all appointed by the Section Chairman.

O33.2.2 Elections Committee - This Committee is responsible for the timely implementation and conduct of the elections for Section Officers. It is their duty to insure a fair election in accordance with the provisions of these Bylaws. This Committee shall be comprised of at least three (3) Section members appointed by the Section Chairman who are not nominees in the current election, who are not members of the current nominating committee, and who have not submitted a nominee for the current election.

033.2.3 Other Committees - As necessary to accomplish specific activities of a short term basis such as Constitution and Bylaws, Special Events, etc.

033.3 Operations and Planning — Each Committee shall prepare a yearly activities plan. No Officer, Committee, or Section member shall commit the name Orlando Section IEEE (explicitly or by inference) to any endeavor without approval of the Section Executive Committee.

034 Terms of Office

The term of office shall begin on 1 July for elected offices and immediately after appointment for appointed officers and shall expire on 30 June or until a sucessor is elected/appointed and takes office; whichever comes last. No elected Officer may hold the same office for which he was elected by the Section membership for more than two successive years.

035 Duties and Responsibilities

The Guidelines contained in the IEEE Section Manual shall be used to guide the operations of each Office and Committee when they do not conflict

with these bylaws. Supplemental Manuals are also available to assist in the operation of Standing and Special Committees. These Manuals are available on request to IEEE Headquarters.

040 Selection of Officers

- O41 The Section Chairman shall appoint by January 15th of each year a Nominating Committee consisting of at least three (3) Section members not then elected Section officers.
- O42 The Nominating Committee shall present its slate of nominees to the Section Chairman by February 10 so that all Section members may be notified of the nominations through the March 1 issue of the Orlando Section Notes.
- O43 The Section membership may make additional nominations by submitting qualified petitions. A qualified petition shall meet the following conditions:

 a) Specify the office, b) Bear the signature of at least 15 voting Section members, c) Contain statement of nominee's consent to serve, d) State nominee's qualifications (see Section 032) and biography, e) Be delivered to the Section Chairman on or before 1 April.
- O44 The Section Chairman shall appoint an Elections Committee by 5 April of each year. Whenever there is more than one nimonee for any office, the Elections Committee will prepare a resume of all nominees and an election ballot for publication in the May issue of the Orlando Section Notes. The Elections Committee shall establish the address to which the ballots are to be mailed or hand delivered, the procedures for verification and the cutoff date for receipt of ballots. The Elections Committee will advise the Section membership of the time and place for counting the ballots; this event will be open to any Section members. The results of the election will be published in

the next issue of the Orlando Section Notes. In the event of a tie vote, the Executive Committee shall then select the winner by a secret ballot.

O45 In the event there is only one nominee for each office, the Chairman of the Election Committee will cast a unanimous vote for the slate of officers on behalf of the Orlando Section membership without need for a published ballot.

O46 The newly elected officers shall be installed at the Annual Installation Meeting of the Section held in May or June.

047 Vacancies, except for Chairman, occurring during the year shall be filled by Executive Committee action. A vacancy in the Office of Section Chairman shall automatically be filled by the Vice-Chairman.

Q48 Recall — If for any reason the best interests of the Section seem to require a change in the governing body during the administrative year, the matter shall be duly and carefully considered by the Section Executive Committee. Upon not less than a 2/3 vote of the Executive Committee, or upon receipt of a petition signed by fifteen (15) percent of the members of the Section, recommendation shall be made to all the Section members for action at a special Section meeting to be duly called by the Executive Committee for the sole purpose of considering and voting upon such a change. A 2/3 vote of the Section members present shall be necessary to declare an office vacant. The vacant office, except for the Chairman, may be filled for the unexpired term by nominations from the floor and a majority vote of the members present. (The requirements of Section 043 c and d shall apply to all nominations.)

051 Composition

The governing body of the Section shall be known as the Executive Committee. It shall consist of the following:

- 051.1 The four (4) elected section officers
- 051.2 Chairmen of the Standing Committees.
- 051.3 Chairmen of each Group/Society Chapter.
- 051.4 The two most recent past chairmen of the Section who are willing and able to serve on the Executive Committee.
 - 051.5 Chairmen of the Student Branches
- 051.6 Not more than five (5) members-at-large who are appointed by the Section Chairman with approval of the Executive Committee.

052 Voting

- 052.1 All members of the Executive Committee may vote on any and all business of the Committee.
- 052.2 Standing Committee, Student Branch, and Group/Society Chapter Chairmen may designate a voting alternate by notifying the Section Chairman in advance of the meeting.
 - 052.3 No individual shall cast more than one vote.
- 052.4 All voting members of the Executive Committee shall be members of the Orlando Section.

060 The Executive Board

The Executive Board shall be authorized to take action on Section Matters which may be necessary between meetings of the Executive Committee, subject to the Executive Committee approval.

O61 The Board shall consist of the four (4) elected officers and one (1) representative of the Chapters.

O62 Each administrative year at the first meeting of the Executive Committee, the newly elected Chairmen of the Chapters shall elect one of their number as the Chapter representative to the Executive Board.

063 A quorum of the Executive Board shall be three (3) of the five (5) members.

070 Meetings

071 Section Meetings

Section meetings will normally be held during the months of September through June. This Section shall hold no less than five meetings during the year. A quorum at these meetings shall be not less than fifteen (15) members.

072 Executive Committee

The Executive Committee shall meet each month and upon the call of the Section Chairman or Executive Board. A majority of the Executive Committee's voting members shall constitute a quorum. A simple majority vote of the Committee members present shall be required to conduct business. These meetings shall be open to all members of the Orlando Section.

OBO Section Operations

081 Financial

Disbursements shall be made by check where practical; the Treasurer shall select the depository subject to approval by the Executive Committee.

Checks shall be drawn with the Treasurer's signature or with the Chairman's signature.

- 082 Audit

The Section records shall be audited by the Executive Committee or

their designated representatives. An annual audit shall be made at the end of the calendar year and shall be the basis of the Annual Financial Report to IEEE.

083 Group/Society Chapters

The Orlando Section has the policy to encourage the formation and continuous operation of Group/Society Chapters in all specialty fields in which 12 or more members of the Section, above student grade, have an active interest. Each Chapter is encouraged to form its own Bylaws and operational policies in consort with the following provisions necessary for a smooth and efficient interface between the Section and Chapters. The Chapter Bylaws shall also be in accord with the Chapter Operation Guide contained in the IEEE Section Manual.

- 083.1 Each Chapter will operate on a 15 June to 14 June fiscal year.
- 083.2 Each Chapter is to conduct annual elections such that the chairman for the following twelve months has been selected by 1 June of each year.
- 083.3 Each Chapter is to have its chairman or his designated representative(s) at each Section Executive Committee meeting in order that liaison and awareness of each others activities may be maintained.
- 083.4 Each Chapter shall hold at least two meetings each year as prescribed by the IEEE Bylaws.
- 083.5 All Section members shall be notified of all Chapter meetings. This meeting shall be announced in the Orlando Section Notes.
 - O83.6 The Chapter Chairman shall submit an operating budget for

the fiscal year to the Section Treasurer in sufficient time for inclusion in the Section Budget.

083.7 All Chapter meetings will be coordinated with and approved by the Section Program Committee.

083.8 The Chapter Secretary shall prepare a Chapter Meeting report and submit it to the Section Secretary within 10 days after the meeting.

083.9 No Group/Society shall commit the name Orlando Section IEEE (explicitly or by inference) to any endeavor without approval of the Section Executive Committee.

084 Publications

The Section shall publish a periodical named CRLANDO SECTION NOTES, which will be the major medium of communication with the Section membership. Subject to approval of the Executive Committee, the Chairman of the publications Committee shall select the printer, determine format, establish deadlines, set advertising rates, and obtain advertising for the ORLANDO SECTION NOTES.

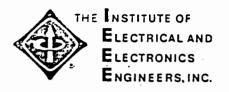
090 Bylaws Amendment

Proposed bylaws or changes thereto, and the reasons therefore, shall be delivered or mailed to the Section Executive Committee members at least twenty days before the stipulated meeting of the Section Executive Committee at which the vote shall be taken. REPORT ON COSTS OF PRINTING SECTION NOTES

Our costs are based on Seminole Printers 1982 rates.

The base figure includes printing, collating and stapling. The figure used for 12 pages and 800 copies is \$204 (\$17/page). Costs for more pages and more copies are proportionally higher.

Ex: March issue of 16 pages and 1100 copies:

204 x
$$\frac{16}{12}$$
 x $\frac{1100}{800}$ = \$374 (23.37/page)

Typesetting is $$10/page \times 12 = 120

Half tones are \$5/ea. x 3 = \$15 (anytime camera is used to size or take a picture)

Total March \$509 + tax

Cost savings by going to another format such as, for example (8½ x ll") are minimal. If we went with 8 pages (equivalent to 16 of our present pages) cost would reduce about 8½%. We would have less flexibility being limited to multiples of 8 pages, and production would take about 1 day longer.

The most significant cost reduction is in # of copies and # of pages.

I recommend the minutes be reduced to a l page summary of significant matters with a statement to the effect that a complete copy will be provided on request. I also recommend we print only 30 copies more than those required.

I also recommend we change our rate schedule for ads to the following:

- 10. I becarwrite awards for excellence in technical program presentation; one award to be made by each of five chapters, to best speaker presenting a program to each chapter during 1984.

- 11. Subsidize purchase of Centennial mementos by IEEE members who are our employees.
- 12. Congratulation to IEEE and its members for the Centennial write-up in company newspaper. List of employees who are members. Identify members who have been active in local Section.
- 13. Exhibition in lobby of company, EE products & IEEE during October open to public.
- 14. Presentation support for displays and posters.

IDEAS FOR PUBLICIZING IEEE CENTENNIAL OBSERVANCE

- Have state, county, and city governments designate an IEEE Centennial Month, with news releases including photos of the signing of proclamations. (Pender McCarter in the IEEE Washington office is preparing such a proclamation for signature by the Governor of Massachusetts, in connection with the IEEE Centennial Convocation in May; a copy will be available to use as a model.)
- 2. Arrange with an engineering employer having an art department to donate the art work for local IEEE entity posters to be used with IEEE Centennial poster displays in libraries, museums, city halls, and corporate lobbies, publicizing the local entity responsible for the display. A version of the local poster can be used as an advertising car card for the interior or exterior of public transit vehicles (where the space can be donated at no charge), and a larger version can be used for a 24- or 30-sheet billboard poster, to be placed by outdoor advertisers on unrented billboards at no cost (reserve this space early).
- 3. Conduct an essay contest among high school students on the subject, "What Electrical Engineering Has Done for Us," with cash prizes for the top essays and Centennial mementoes and certificates for the runners-up. Coordinate with the schools' science/math coordinator to send the notice of the content to all high school math and science teachers. Also publicize through newspapers and house organs of engineering companies.
- 4. Donate IEEE Centennial books, IEEE Dictionary of Terms, and a set of IEEE standards (if needed) to the local library system, with a news release including a photo of the presentation sent to the newspapers and local TV news crews invited to the ceremony.
- 5. Arrange a technology event that can be used by PBS TV or the local PM Magazine program, such as robotics, lasers, a variant on the latest Engineering Fair contest, etc., arranged so the TV host can control the action, through pushing a button or operating the controller. Have the Centennial poster in camera view.
- 6. Arrange programs featuring legislators with interest in growth of high-technology industry. Use the IEEE Centennial Banner as a display at these meetings.
- 7. Arrange with local CATV operators to carry the October 8 centennial program from the Franklin Institute in Philadelphia over their Public Access channel. Some also have arrangements with community colleges for use of an Educational channel, and the colleges may be willing to carry the program on their channel if approached early. Many Holiday Inns and some other motels have ground stations used to receive satellite broadcasts, and may be able to provide reception of the Philadelphia meeting as a part of a local section dinner meeting at the motel.
- 8. Chambers of Commerce sometimes have monthly breakfast meetings for members featuring a speaker on a topic of interest, with the expenses paid by a corporate member having an interest in the speaker's message. Arrange for an engineering employer to cover the cost of the breakfast; the IEEE entity provides the speaker, perhaps with a 15-minute version of the Centennial slide show conveying the message that electrical engineering has benefitted mankind in many ways.

- 9. Establish a speakers bureau consisting of IEEE entity members having a general interest message, the Centennial slide show, or a videotape that can be presented to civic clubs, school assemblies, church dinner groups, etc. Chambers of Commerce maintain lists of these groups with contact information for their program chairmen, and they welcome offers of speakers.
- 10. Use variations on the poster artwork to imprint T-shirts and bumper stickers with Centennial messages, for sale to members.
- 11. Organize a member letter-writing campaign, sending letters to the editors of area newspapers on the centennial theme during the designated IEEE Centennial Month, noting the debt of gratitude we all owe electrical engineering for the conveniences we all enjoy.
- 12. Work with the business managers of local newspapers to schedule a newspaper supplement on the Centennial theme during the centennial month. If advertising from engineering firms covers 60 percent of the insert, the 40 percent editorial content will be free and can publicize local IEEE entities, engineering schools, special interest member occupations and/or hobbies, etc. Twelve pages is a good size for this, representing one unit on the printing press. Local members can offer to write stories on the history of electrical/electronics engineering in the area, on local innovations that later spread to general usage, etc.
- 13. Offer stories to business editors of local newspapers with Centennial themes; arrange interviews for reporters, perhaps with local life members who can outline the changes seen during their professional careers.

Regarding Section activities, USAF can supply interesting speakers. John Hiller stated that he is available for one day seminars at no charge to the Section.

George Abbott spoke on career planning. He pointed out that self education for older engineers is a must; the Society can provide both career development and continuing education aids.

George made the projound statement; "Doctors are practioneers of medicine "Lawyers are practioneers of law" and "Engineers are practioneers of technology".

Jim Watson-SPAC (student Professional Activities Chairman) offered some ideas on how IEEE benefits the engineering student. These include self assessment, career path, ethics, public issues, skill development, communication, leadership, personal economic factors and salary information.

In order to stimulate student interest in IEEE, the the student IEEE leaders should include faculity in activities. They should bring in outside speakers from within the profession, have informal discussions and have engineering banquets, etc.

Ron Wajtasinski stated that successful PACE programs and activities should begin at the Section Level.

Sections should be going for the <u>Exemplary Award</u>. We should refer to the guidlines for obtaining this award.

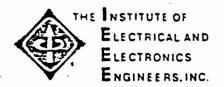
Eylaws- this was voted on and passed.

PUBLIC RELATIONS IN IEEE

Notes for a talk by Robert H. Tanner, P.E.

Before we talk about "how", let's ask "why?".

Why should IEEE have a Public Relations or Public Information Program?

One of its main objects is to inform the public, not about IEEE, but about the Electrical Engineer.

The public should know more about electrical engineers for two reasons: firstly it knows almost nothing about us at present, and secondly we are worth knowing.

Doctors and lawyers can be made the heroes, occasionally the villains, of stirring TV shows; unfortunately engineering does not lend itself to the same treatment.

YET - Engineers, especially electrical engineers, have probably done more for humanity than both the other professions put together. We have lots to tell people about. Just think for a moment what life in the civilized world would be without electrical engineering - no electric light or heat, no telephones or telegraph, no computers, diesel powered cars with acetylene lights, the list is almost endless. How many motors do you have in your house? And how many transistors?

Yes, we have an important story to tell, so how should we go about it? Should we rely entirely on the P.I. Director at H.Q. to do it for us?

No, the IEEE way does not rely primarily on staff, it relies on the volunteers, you and me. More specifically, it relies on networks of volunteers. like the Regional Network, from the V.P. of RAB to the Section Chairman.

We need a P.R. Network stretching from the H.Q. P.I. Committee to representatives in each section all over the world. We in Region 3 can be the first to set up such a network, and show the rest of the Institute the way.

Before going into details, I must point out one very serious obstacle that any such network must overcome, and that is the inherent nature of engineers themselves. Most of us went into our profession because we were more interested in things than in people; we cannot realize why others do not recognize our value without our having to explain it to them. We are certainly a creative profession, but we also tend to be a silent one.

Fortunately, to help overcome this obstacle, we have here in the United

States one great advantage - the local nature of the media.

In Europe, most countries have only national radio and TV networks, and big national newspapers. The local newspapers tend to be weeklies devoted to publishing local births, marriages and deaths and similar engrossing items. As a result they have very small circulations and little influence.

Here, on the other hand, radio, TV and newspapers are much more locally oriented, while at the same time carrying national and world news. There is therefore a real opportunity for local IEEE entities to make themselves heard at least in the neighborhoods which they serve.

From what I have seen of Tom White, our Staff Director of Public Information at H.Q., I believe that good support for such local efforts will be forthcoming, but the first thing that we can do is to get organized at the Section level.

Firstly, it is up to you Section officers to find a Public Relations/Information representative for the Section. Note that I say "find" and not "appoint"; this is a position which requires at least a definite interest in the subject, better still some previous or continuing experience in the field. Perhaps one of your members is doing similar work for his company. If possible, choose someone who is prepared to stay with the job for several years; the position should not be regarded as being in the normal line of succession through the offices to Section Chairman.

The reason for this is that a successful P.I. representative will need to establish close and friendly relations with the staffs of the local newspapers, radio and TV stations. Such relationships will probably take time to develop and it would be a great pity if the process had to be restarted each year.

Let me list what would be expected of a section Public Information representative:

- 1. Firstly and most importantly, he would make personal contacts with the appropriate staff members of local newspapers (both daily and weekly) and of TV and radio stations, stressing how he could help them not only with IEEE and electrical engineering news, but also when any other engineering or technical stories break.
- 2. With these contacts made, he would feed the media with stories, both of local achievements (awards, important engineering feats, etc.) and of achievements of a more general nature which would be fed to him from H.Q.
- 3. He would send copies of all his local stories, and anything else which he thinks might be of more general interest to H.Q., so that

the most significant can be fed to other Regional networks or disseminated direct from H.Q. to the National media.

- 4. With friends in the local media, he should have little difficulty in getting at least occasional mention of Section meetings, especially when the speaker or the event are of greater than usual public interest. In such cases, he might well be able to arrange for the speaker to be interviewed on TV for the early news, and might get a report of the meeting published in the next day's paper.
- 5. He would show the section's approval to media representatives, for example by occasionally giving them tickets to a section dinner or banquet.
- 6. He would keep his Region Coordinator and IEEE H.Q. informed of his activities, especially of his successes, since they may be of interest to others throughout the Institute.
- 7. He would attend and be prepared to assist in P.I. seminars and workshops at National, Region, Area and Council meetings, whenever these are within his reach.

It is by efforts like these, multiplied by the number of IEEE entities throughout the world, multiplied again by similar activities by other engineering bodies, that we will begin to get the public to understand what we already know — that technology can provide the best hope for mankind for the future, and that technology is furthered through the activities of Engineering, the creative and newsworthy profession.

- 8. FCES- Monitor activities, define role and interest (if any) by FCIEEE.

- 1. Newsletter The newsletter will continue to be published on a quarterly basis. I would like to put emphasis on Section activities and communication.
 - Section newsletters provide a great deal of information. At present, I receive only FWC, Orlando and Palm Beach. Put the FCIEEE Officers on your mailing lists.
 - Program Clearinghouse: An initial form of this will be printed as part of "Section Activities". I hope that we can print a list of topics and speakers about November, after Sections have firmed up much of the 1984-85 schedules.
 - Centennial Awards: I am trying to put together a list of "Centennial Awards" in Florida. Although I am trying to get this from HQ, I would appreciate a list from each Section.
 - Any special activities awards, seminars, exceptional programs, etc. are encouraged for this newsletter.
- 2. Some sections have not completed Directory forms; do it now! Also, after May elections, notify both George McClure and myself of new officer names and addresses. A copy of the forms you send to HQ is fine.
- 3. The 1983 IEEE Salary Survey is free to each section upon written request of the Section Chairman -- Washington office. Every section should get a copy for member use.
- 4. Section/Society Rebate Incentive Program: This will be an excellent way of increasing the checkbook balances! Full publicity of this through meetings (say something to the non-members!), newsletters (offer something for joining new socie ties) and area companies is urged. Remember that the appropriate code must be on the application to receive credit (1985 robate). Make sure you have plenty of forms on hand.
- IN 5. IEEE Short Courses "Promo Plan" -- A rebate of \$100 per attendee (member or non-member) will be awarded to sections. The sections are to publicize the short courses in their newsletters. The first course

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is "Intel SDK-85 Microcomputer Workshop", with a "take home" fully assembled Intel SDK-85 Microcomputer with power supply. It will be held in Piscataway May 21-23, 1984, at the IEEE Service Center. Cost is \$675 members, \$750 non-members. Alternate locations for future courses should be encouraged.

- 6. Satellite Courses: 4 new satellite courses are being offered by EAB:
 - June 12 Software for Personal Computers
 - Sept. 11 Case Studies in Project Management
 - Oct. 8 VISI and its Impact on Engineers' Careers
 - Dec. 4 Integrated manufacturing Systems

Under a new price structure, each entity will pay \$600 flat fee for the right to receive the broadcast. Registration fees are set by the section, with the constraint that members fees are less than non-member fees. This could be an excellent opportunity to put on a seminar and raise money, with little work by the section.

- 7. Centennial Big dates are the May 15th Sections Congress in Boston and the Activities on May 13 and 14, and the Centennial Convocation on October 8-9 in Philadelphia. The October 8 meeting will be broadcast by satellite at 8:30 p.m. EST for 2 hours. Each section should consider celebrating the Centennial with a dinner meeting at this time. Each section is responsible for arranging for receiving the broadcast in their area, but the broadcast itself is free.
- 8. PACE Rumor is that PACE will pay the costs of any newsletter that will print a page of PACE-related information. I Jelin Miller

9. Career Guidance - Assist in setting up career management seminars for experienced engineers; work with local secondary schools to provide Career Day speakers on engineering topics.

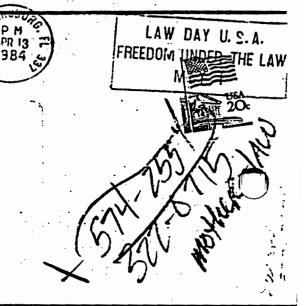

BYLAWS OF THE ORLANDO SECTION, IEEE (Revised 6/35/84)

010 Section Name

This organization shall be known as the Orlando Section of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers.

020 Section Territory

The Orlando Section shall be composed of IEEE members whose IEEE mailing addresses are within the following counties, all in the State of Florida:

- 021 Orange County
- 022 Osceola County
- 023 Seminole County
- 024 Lake County
- 025 Sumter County
- 030 Section Officers
 - 031 Elected Officers and Duties

The following Officers shall be elected by the general membership of the Section: Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer.

031.1 Chairman - The Section Chairman is the executive officer of the Section and has general supervision of the affairs of the Section. One of his chief duties is to act as Chairman of the Section Executive Committee, to hold regular meetings of that committee and see that, by action of that committee,

the affairs of the Section are handled properly and in the best interests of IEEE. He shall appoint chairmen for all standing committees of the section. Each year, he shall appoint a Nominating Committee not later than the date set for the Executive Committee meeting in January and an Elections Committee not later than the date set for the Executive Committee meeting in April. He shall appoint other special committees and members—at—large (see Section 051.6) as deemed necessary to accomplish specific tasks. The Chairman presides at all meetings of the Section and represents the Section at all IEEE meetings. He serves as the Section representative on the Regional Committee and shall serve as the representative of the Section in the Florida Council of IEEE (FCIEEE).

O31.2 Vice Chairman - The Vice Chairman shall automatically become the chairman when a vacancy in the Chairman's Office is created by any situation. The Vice Chairman shall perform the duties of the Chairman in the conduct of the Section and the Executive Committee whenever the Chairman is unable to attend or participate in those activities. He shall acquire, compile, and distribute material releyant to the duties of each office (elected and appointed) as presented in the IEEE Section Manual and augmented by Orlando Section Bylaws. The Vice Chairman shall serve as a member of the Finance Committee. He is an alternate delegate from the Section to the Florida Council of IEEE and shall serve as the Section representative at any meeting of the Florida Council of IEEE in the absence of the Section Chairman.

031.3 Secretary - The Secretary shall record and distribute the minutes of all Section and Executive Committee meetings. He is also responsible for preparing the Section Annual Report, summarizing all of the meeting activities of the Section and Group/Society Chapters for the calendar

year, submitting this annual report so that it complies with IEEE Headquarters rebate deadline dates. The Secretary shall keep a file of all significant correspondence, records, and reports of the Section for the administrative year.

O31.4 Treasurer - The Treasurer is custodian of all funds of the Section. He shall keep a record of all financial activities of the Section, maintain a checking account in the name of the Section, and invest, with approval of the Executive Committee, all idle funds of the Section. The Treasurer shall serve as Chairman of the Section Finance Committee which shall include the Junior Past Chairman and the Vice-Chairman. He shall assist the Section Chairman in preparing a Section Budget, which shall be presented as defined in Section 071 herein to the Section Executive Committee for approval. He is then responsible for managing that budget by recording the income and expenditures in relation to the Budget. Any overrun of the Budget shall be immediately brought to the attention of the Section Executive Committee. He shall submit a report covering the financial activities since the last previous report at each regular Executive Committee meeting. He shall submit a Section Financial Report for the prior calendar year to the IEEE General Manager and to the Regional Director no later than February 1 of the current year.

032 Officer Elected by the Chapters

A Group/Society Chapters Representative shall be elected by the chapter chairmen each year at the August meeting of the Executive Committee, or as soon thereafter as a quorum consisting of half the chapter chairman plus one can be convened. The outgoing Group/Society Chapters Repesentative shall continue to serve until a successor is elected. The Group/Society Chapters

Representative is a member of the Executive Board. He may be a present or past chapter chairman; his role is to act as spokesman for the chapters, to advise them on procedural matters, and to maintain a meeting calendar for chapters and section meetings, assisting in setting meeting dates to avoid conflicts between meetings.

033 Qualification for Elected Officers

All Elected Officers must be members of the Orlando Section at the time of nomination and must maintain an active membership status throughout the term of office. They must be willing and able to serve in the capacity for which they are nominated.

034 Appointed Officers and Duties

The Section Chairman shall appoint chairmen for each of the following standing committees and shall appoint special committees as required. Such appointees shall serve at the pleasure of the Section chairman.

034.1 Standing Committees

034.1.1 Program Committee - This Committee shall provide the programs and speakers for Section meetings as directed by the Section Chairman and the Executive Committee. It coordinates the timing of section meetings with the Group/Society Chapter Representative. This committee shall also make all arrangements for facilities and for the printing and distribution of tickets for Section meetings and shall prepare and maintain a current list of facilities that may be used for chapter meetings. The list, to include capacities, prices, dinner options, and reservation information, shall be provided to the incoming chapter program chairmen each June.

034.1.2 Membership and Development Committee - This Committee shall

maintain an updated list of all members in the Section and is responsible for bringing the advantages of IEEE membership to the attention of potential members within the Orlando Section territory. It sends letters of welcome to new members and to members transferring into the Section area, encouraging them to become active in Section affairs. This Committee is also responsible for encouraging transfers to highest grades for which existing members are qualified. In carrying out these duties, this committee shall maintain and distribute an adequate supply of related literature and applications issued by IEEE Headquarters for the purpose of membership and transfers, and shall distribute and collect the attendance cards at each Section meeting.

034.1.3 Public Relations Committee - This committee shall be responsible for properly advertising meetings of the Section and for all local publicity on IEEE matters, including releases to the press on IEEE awards and appointments, and other matters of professional or human interest involving Section members. It shall maintain a media mailing list with current names and addresses to be used for press release dissemination. It shall be guided in ts activities by the "IEEE Public Relations Guide".

034.1.4 Publication Committee - This committee is responsible for publishing and distributing the Orlando Section Notes. In this capacity, this committee shall seek and acquire suitable paid advertisements for the Notes in order to minimize costs to the Section for their publication. This committee is also responsible for the maintenance and control of the Orlando Section Non-Profit Organization Mailing Permit.

034.1.5 Awards Committee - This committee shall acquaint themselves with all IEEE and other related awards taking appropriate action for the active

participation of the Section in recommending deserving candidates for those awards. In addition, this committee shall establish an on-going Awards Program to recognize technical excellence and IEEE service within the Orlando Section.

034.1.6 Florida Engineering Society (FES) Liaison Committee

This Committee is responsible for maintaining close contact and liaison with FES for the joint purpose of enhancing the professional status of engineers. This committee is not included in determining the presence of a quorum.

034.1.7 Professional Activities Committee for Engineers (PACE) This committee shall promote and implement those objectives which reflect the
professional principles covered in the IEEE Constitution. This committee shall
also be guided by the policies and directives of the National and Region III
PACE groups.

034.1.8 Student Activities Committee - This Committee shall include all IEEE Student Branch Counselors within the territory of the Orlando Section.

This Committee is responsible for establishing Section cooperation with the Student Branches and supporting Student activities within the Section and Region. The representation of this committee is not included in determining the presence of a quorum.

034.1.9 Finance Committee - This Committee, composed of the junior past chairman, the section vice chairman, and chaired by the section treasurer, will be responsible for reviewing the financial affairs of the Section and take initiative for making recommendations to the Executive Committee when warranted. It shall review the annual budget in advance of its submission to the Executive Committee. Since its members are counted otherwise, this

committee is not included in determining the presence of a quorum.

034.1.10 Conference Committee - This committee shall be responsible for coordinating Section activities in the support or production of technical conferences or seminars, including making recommendations for such involvement, proposing appropriate facility and other arrangements for them subject to Section approval, and extending invitations to IEEE entities to hold conferences, seminars, or technical exhibitions within the Section's jurisdiction. This committee coordinates closely with the Education committee for the production of short courses and other educational endeavors beneficial to the section. This committee is not counted in determining a quorum.

034.1.11 Historian - This committee maintains archival records of interest in recording the history of the Section, and prepares (with annual updates) a narrative describing the activities of the Section, from which excerpts can be taken as appropriate in defining awards eligibility, Section growth, etc. This committee is not counted in determining the presence of a quorum.

034.1.12 Education Committee - This committee is responsible for the planning and execution of programs to aid in members' continuing education, through the conduct of tutorials and short courses. Budgets for such activity sponsored by the Section require approval of the Section Executive Committee. This committee is not counted in determining the presence of a quorum.

034.1.13 Other Committees - as necessary to accomplish defined activities that require functioning of the Committee on a continuing or "year-around" basis. They are not included in determining the presence of a quorum without amending these bylaws.

034.2 Special Committees

O34.2.1 Nominating Committee - This Committee shall select from the Section membership candidates qualified for the elective offices of the Section: Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer. The Committee shall determine that each nominee is eligible and willing to accept the responsibilities of the office, if elected. This Committee shall comprise at least three (3) members (not currently seeking an elected office) who are all appointed by the Section Chairman. Duties of this Committee are described in Section 042.

034.2.2 Elections Committee - This Committee is responsible for the timely implementation and conduct of the elections for Section Officers. It is their duty to insure a fair election in accordance with the provisions of these Bylaws. This Committee shall comprise at least three (3) Section members appointed by the Section Chairman who are not nominees in the current election, who are not members of the current nominating committee, and who have not submitted a nominee for the current election. Duties of this Committee are described in Section 044.

034.2.3 Other Committees - Other committees shall be established as necessary to accomplish specific activities of a short term basis such as Constitution and Bylaws, Special Events, etc.

034.3 Operations and Planning - Each Committee shall prepare a yearly activities plan. No Officer, Committee, or Section member shall commit the name Orlando Section IEEE (explicitly or by inference) to any endeavor without approval of the Section Executive Committee.

035 Terms of Office

The term of office shall begin on 1 July for elected offices and immediately after appointment for appointed officers and shall expire on 30 June or until a sucessor is elected/appointed and takes office; whichever comes last. No elected Officer may hold the same office for which he was elected by the Section membership for more than two successive years.

036 Duties and Responsibilities

The Guidelines contained in the IEEE Section Manual shall be used to guide the operations of each Office and Committee when they do not conflict with these bylaws. Supplemental Manuals are also available to assist in the operation of Standing and Special Committees. These Manuals are available on request to IEEE Headquarters.

040 Selection of Officers

- O41 The Section Chairman shall appoint by the Executive Committee meeting in January of each year a Nominating Committee consisting of at least three (3) Section members not then elected Section officers.
- O42 The Nominating Committee shall present its slate of nominees to the Section Chairman at the February Executive Committee meeting so that all Section members may be notified of the nominations through the March issue of the Orlando Section Notes.
- O43 The Section membership may make additional nominations by submitting qualified petitions. A qualified petition shall meet the following conditions:

 a) Specify the office, b) Bear the signature of at least 15 voting Section members, c) Contain statement of nominee's consent to serve, d) State nominee's qualifications and biography, e) Be delivered to the Section Chairman on or before 1 April.

April Executive Committee meeting each year. Whenever there is more than one nominee for any office, the Elections Committee will prepare a resume of all nominees and an election ballot for publication in the May issue of the Orlando Section Notes. The Elections Committee shall establish the address to which the ballots are to be mailed or hand delivered, the procedures for verification and the cutoff date for receipt of ballots. The Elections Committee will advise the Section membership of the time and place for counting the ballots; this event shall be open to any Section members. The results of the election will be provided to the Publication Chairman in time to be published in the June issue of the Orlando Section Notes. In the event of a tie vote, the Executive Committee shall then select the winner by a secret ballot.

O45 In the event there is only one nominee for each office, the Chairman of the Election Committee will cast a unanimous vote for the slate of officers on behalf of the Orlando Section membership without need for a published ballot.

046 The newly elected officers shall be installed at the Annual Installation Meeting of the Section held in June.

Vacancies in elected offices, except for Section Chairman, occurring during the year shall be filled by Executive Committee action. A vacancy in the office of Section Chairman shall automatically be filled by the Vice-Chairman. The resulting vice-chairman vacancy shall then be filled by Executive Committee action. A vacant office, except for the Chairman, may be filled for the unexpired term by nominations from the floor and a majority vote of the members present. (The requirements of Section 043 c and d shall apply

to all nominations and may be submitted either written or orally.)

O48 Recall - If for any reason the best interests of the Section seem to require a change in the governing body during the administrative year, the matter shall be duly and carefully considered by the Section Executive Committee. Upon not less than a 2/3 vote of the Executive Committee, or upon receipt of a petition signed by fifteen (15) percent of the members of the Section, recommendation shall be made to all the Section members for action at a special Section meeting to be duly called by the Executive Committee for the sole purpose of considering and voting upon such a change. A 2/3 vote of the Section members present shall be necessary to declare an office vacant.

Vacancies are filled as specified in Section 047. The provisions of this section do not apply to standing committees (appointed by and serving at the pleasure of the Section Chairman) or to Group/Society Chapter officers, who are treated elsewhere.

050 The Executive Committee

051 Composition

The governing body of the Section shall be known as the Executive Committee. It shall consist of the following:

- 051.1 The four (4) elected section officers
- 051.2 A Group/Society Chapter Representative
- 051.3 Chairmen of the Standing Committees.
- 051.4 Chairmen of each Group/Society Chapter.
- 051.5 The two most recent past chairmen of the Section who are willing and able to serve on the Executive Committee.
 - 051.6 Chairmen of the Student Branches/Chapters

051.7 Not more than five (5) members-at-large who are appointed by the Section Chairman with approval of the Executive Committee.

052 Voting

No vote by the Executive Committee shall be binding unless a quorum is present. A majority of the following voting members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum:

The four elected section officers

The Group/Society Chapters Representative

The Group/Society Chapters Chairmen

The following Committee chairmen:

Program

Publications

Professional Activities

Awards

Membership and Development

Public Relations

- 052.1 All members of the Executive Committee may vote on any and all business of the Committee.
- 052.2 Standing Committee, Student Branch/Chapter, and Group/Society Chapter Chairmen may designate a voting alternate by notifying the Section Chairman in advance of the meeting.
- 052.3 No individual shall cast more than one vote, although an individual designated in writing to the Chairman to act by proxy for an absent elected or appointed member may vote for the absent member in addition to casting his own vote. If the proxy is for a quorum-counted member, the proxy

shall be counted in the quorum.

052.4 All voting members of the Executive Committee shall be members of the Orlando Section.

060 The Executive Board

The Executive Board shall be authorized to take action on Section matters which may be necessary between meetings of the Executive Committee, subject to the Executive Committee approval.

061 The Board shall consist of the four (4) elected officers and the duly elected Group/Society Chapters representative.

062 A quorum of the Executive Board shall be three (3) of the five (5) members.

070 Section Operations

The Section administrative year shall be July 1 to June 30.

071 Financial

071.1 Fiscal Operations

The Section fiscal year shall run from July 1 to June 30.

Disbursements shall be made by check where practical; the Treasurer shall select the depository subject to approval by the Executive Committee. Checks shall be drawn with the Treasurer's signature or with the Chairman's signature.

Section rebates, refunds to Society Chapters by parent scieties for meeting activities, surpluses from tutorials, conferences, or other special events sponsored by chapters of the Orlando Section, and repayments of monies advanced to chapters by the Section, shall all accrue to the account of the Section treasury.

071.2 Budget

The outgoing Treasurer shall prepare a proposed budget for the following year and submit it to the incoming section Chairman and Treasurer by July 1.

071.3 Final Budget

The Treasurer shall submit a final budget for the section at the October Executive Committee meeting

071.4 Operating Budget

The Section shall begin operations July 1, using the proposed budget as a guide until the final budget is approved in October.

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072 Audit

The Section financial records shall be audited by the Finance Committee. An audit shall be made whenever there is a change of Section Treasurer, by an audit committee appointed by the Section Chairman. An annual audit shall be made by the Finance Committee at the end of the calendar year and shall be the basis of the Annual Financial Report to IEEE Headquarters.

073 Group/Society Chapters

The Orlando Section has the policy to encourage the formation and continuous operation of Group/Society Chapters in all specialty fields in which 12 or more members of the Section, above student grade, have an active interest. Each Chapter shall form its own Bylaws and operational policies in concert with the following provisions necessary for a smooth and efficient interface between the Section and Chapters. The Chapter Bylaws shall also be in accord with the Chapter Operation Guide contained in the IEEE Section Manual and the Orlando Section Bylaws.

073.1 Each Chapter will operate on a 1 July to 30 June fiscal

year.

- 073.2 Each Chapter is to conduct annual elections such that the chairman for the following twelve months has been selected by the date of the June Executive Committee meeting each year.
- 073.3 Each Chapter is to have its chairman or his designated representative(s) at each Section Executive Committee meeting in order that liaison and awareness of each others' activities may be maintained.
- 073.4 Each Chapter shall hold at least two meetings each year as prescribed by the IEEE Bylaws.
- 073.5 All Section members shall be notified of all Chapter meetings. These meetings shall be announced in the Orlando Section Notes.
 - 073.6 Chapter Operating Budgets
- 073.6.1 The outgoing Chapter Chairman shall submit a proposed operating budget for the following fiscal year to the Section Treasurer and to the incoming chapter chairman by the June Executive Committee meeting.
- 073.6.2 The incoming chapter chairman shall be responsible for submitting a final budget by the September Executive Committee meeting.
- 073.6.3 Chapters may begin operations on July 1 using the proposed budget as a guide until the section budget is approved.
- O73.6.4 Chapters will have control of their budgeted funds. If expenditures will exceed the amount approved in the operating budget, chapters will be required to have their budgets amended by a vote of the Executive Committee or by the Executive Board at a specially-called meeting. Chapter meeting rebates from parent Societies shall revert to the Section Treasurer's account (see Section O71).

073.7 All Chapter meetings will be coordinated by the Group/Society Chapter Representative.

073.8 The Chapter Secretary shall prepare a Chapter Meeting report and submit it to the Section Secretary within 10 days after each meeting.

073.9 No Group/Society shall commit the name Orlando Section IEEE (explicitly or by inference) to any endeavor without approval of the Section Executive Committee.

074 Florida Council IEEE Activity

The Orlando Section, as a member section in the Florida Council of IEEE, participates fully in the meetings and activities of that body. Unless otherwise designated, the section chairman and vice chairman are the section representative and alternate representative to the Council, empowered to vote on behalf of the section in Council matters. If these representatives are unable to attend a duly called Florida Council meeting, it shall be the responsibility of the section chairman to designate a proxy to vote the Orlando Section's votes at the meeting. This designation shall be in writing, addressed to the Chairman, Florida Council, and dispatched in sufficient time to be received prior to the meeting concerned. The designated proxy may be the chairman of the Florida Council.

075 Publications

The Section shall publish a periodical named ORLANDO SECTION NOTES, which will be the major medium of communication with the Section membership.

Subject to approval of the Executive Committee, the Chairman of the publications Committee shall select the printer, determine format, establish

deadlines, set advertising rates, and obtain advertising for the ORLANDO SECTION NOTES. His committee may include a business manager charged with the responsibility for advertising sales, billings, and collections. Funds received from advertising shall be deposited with the Section Treasurer as soon as practicable.

080 Meetings

081 Section Meetings

Section meetings will normally be held during the months of September through June. This Section shall hold no less than three meetings during the year.

082 Executive Committee Meetings

The Executive Committee shall meet each month, except in July, and upon the call of the Section Chairman or Executive Board. A quorum must be present to conduct business (see Section 052). These meetings shall be open to all members of the Orlando Section.

. 090 Bylaws Amendment

Proposed bylaws or changes thereto, and the reasons therefore, shall be delivered or mailed to the Section Executive Committee members at least twenty days before the stipulated meeting of the Section Executive Committee at which the vote shall be taken. Two-thirds of all votes cast at that meeting shall be required to approve any new Bylaws, amendment or revocation. Any revised Bylaws shall be submitted for approval by the Regional Director.

100 General

These Bylaws establish the governing, operations and administration of the Orlando Section in accordance with the provisions contained in the IEEE

Constitution and Bylaws.
