Lee Stogner, the Region 3 MDC chair, has an active program to help sections grow their membership, including short "elevator speeches" about the advantages of membership (to welcome non-members

Region 3 is fortunate to have leadership in affinity groups for GOLD, Life Members, and Women in Engineering. None of these groups is gender-discriminatory. Membership in IEEE Women in Engineering is available to all higher-grade members (but not to society affiliates) for a fee that includes the electronic membership directory. Student members and life members can have free membership. Add SOC ID WIE050 to your renewal to join.

Is the image of engineers as geeks or nerds discouraging women from entering engineering or computer science careers? Women with the aptitude, prerequisite course work, and interest in engineering could be encouraged to pursue technical careers. engineers in their extended families. Both the genes and environment are likely conducive to growing new Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) bachelor's degrees. In 1966, women earned 24.5 percent of the STEM bachelor's degrees; by 2004, they earned 49.2 percent. Women also made gains at the master's and doctoral levels, according to the Commission on Professionals in Science and Technology. In February a woman engineer remarked, in the IEEE-USA Employment and Career Strategies online community, that

"The best way to improve the image of female engineers is to have more of us."

Ta da! A blog for IEEE Region 3

The whole world has heard about blogs, one of the key elements of Web 2.0. Blogs are one of the technologies that lead Time Magazine to select You as the person of the year. Now Region 3 volunteers have a blog to call their own.



Screenshot of the Region 3 Blog providing timely information for IEEE volunteers


Based on the success of the Richmond Section blog, the Communications Committee began discussions on blogging to support the Region. Dave Green, Region 3 Electronic Communications Systems Coordinator, jumped in and started a site on bloger.com. We began to experiment to see how blogs might be useful for communications within the region. The test bed looked at how we could benefit our members and the volunteers that serve them. We quickly decided to focus the initial blog towards IEEE Region 3 volunteers, but all members have access.

So everyone has heard of Blogs, but how many of you know how to use them? You could visit the site at ieee3.blogspot.com on a regular basis. Yeah, right. Any problem that technology creates, technology can also solve. The solution in this situation is Really Simple Syndication. These Extensible Markup Language (XML) files posted to a web server contain excerpts from the blog entries. Sites with this technology frequently

provide a link to their newsfeed. They may also choose to display the reasonable or reasonable icon, like a secret code for those in the know.

While those of you who like to tell jokes in hexadecimal may choose to read these using ftp and vi, the rest of the world uses a feedreader. Looking a little like an old-fashioned newsreader, a feedreader checks all your RSS feeds and displays them in a single window.

One of the quickest ways to get started is to create an account on www.bloglines.com. This is a free service and allows you to check your feeds from home and work without installing anything on your computer. Once you start looking for those links and icons. You will be able to read other sections blogs, the Spectrum highlights, and at least abstracts from just about all the other IEEE publications.



Once you are hooked, you might want to look at one of the various free or low cost client based solutions including plug-ins for your mail user agent. But to paraphrase the Food Network, hey that's another article.

Call for 2008 Fellow Nominations

Nominations are being accepted for the IEEE Fellows class of 2008. The rank of IEEE Fellow is the institute's highest member grade, bestowed on IEEE senior members who have contributed "to the advancement or application of engineering, science and technology." The deadline for nominations is 1 March 2007.

Senior members can be nominated in one of four categories: application engineer/practitioner, research engineer/scientist, educator or technical leader.

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Is Your Section Healthy?

Is your section healthy? Is there something Region 3 could do to help your section benefit its members more?

At Sections Congress 2005, Charles Rubenstein delivered a presentation on section/chapter activities to deliver value to members. While his focus was on societies, Region 3 is delivering the soft-skill programs he talked about – leadership skills development workshops and project management workshops. You can revisit his presentation at http://tinyurl.com/2edkq5. It included numerous program topic ideas. As Dr. Rubenstein notes, a leader is a communicator, an educator, and a motivator. We want to help you with your leadership in all three areas.

Relevant programs can improve section/chapter vitality. Region 3 can help with professional awareness conferences for students (S-PACs) and mid-career members (M-PACs). Societies can help chapters with distinguished lecturers and (in some cases) stipends for meeting support or even for organizing new chapters.

Continuing education is a high priority for many members. IEEE's ExpertNOW has 31 courses available this month, and more are planned. Cost to members is \$69.95 each. For the course catalog see http://www.netg.com/ieee/courselistings.asp

Two years ago, a breakout session at a Region 3 meeting brought out numerous ideas for improving section vitality. These were reported in an earlier Newsletter. Some sections have multiple locations with member concentrations. These sections are candidates for webcast meetings, as an alternative to alternating meeting locations. Region 3's Communications Committee has been exploring various forms for remote meetings.

Bring your ideas to the Region meeting in Richmond. What has worked for you? What unmet needs does your section or area/council have that the region can assist with? In addition to our nine major initiatives, we are compiling Best Practices for use by other sections and chapters. Bring or email your successful practices to add to the list that can be accessed by other sections.

And tell us about your problems, too! That's the first step to developing a solution.

Do you know what your members want/need that will improve their perception of value from their IEEE membership? What would your non-member colleagues find attractive to convince them to join IEEE? The diversity of IEEE resources means that most members are not aware of what is available to them, to say nothing of non-members.

The focal point for membership development is your section membership chair and committee. If your section lacks a membership chair, appoint one now, so you can report that at the Region 3 meeting. At every meeting of a section or chapter, there should be a welcome including a 20- to 30-second "elevator speech" summarizing the benefits of membership, continuing education, professional programs, technical meetings, access to your section activities, etc.

Tell us what you need. Region 3 is here to serve YOU.

Membership Development

From the November IEEE Membership Development Report,

"Overall IEEE Membership crept forward this month, rising to a 1.3% annual gain as compared to the 0.8% increase reported last month. This marks the first time this year that the year-to-year increase in membership has exceeded 1% - a not so insignificant accomplishment considering that back in February, membership was down by 3.3% from the prior year and at a four-year low. Through the diligent efforts of our MD volunteers in recruiting and recovering members over the past 9 months, we now stand at the highest level for a November since 2002."

In Region 3, we dropped 172 Members during 2006. While this represents an overall drop, it does represent a smaller yearly decrease compared to recent years. I believe we have reached the point where we can begin growing the overall Membership of Region 3.

For 2007, let's focus on the basics,

1. Make sure that renewing and prospective Members know the value and benefits of Membership. We've made it easy for you to know and share this information.

and on the MD Virtual Community at, https://www.ieeecommunities.org/ieee.md.net

If you're not a member of the MD Virtual Community, let me know and I will "invite" you.

2. Work directly with the Section Chair and the Section MD Chair. Every Section has received a Membership Recruitment Kit. Membership Communications will flow directly to this grassroots team. Communications will consist of telephone calls, e-notices, web casts and ongoing mailouts. The next MD web cast will be on February 14. MD Training will be provided to every Region 3 Section at Southeastcon 2007.

Every Section will need to staff the MD Chair position and encourage attendance at the training seminar.

3. Develop the Student Member pipeline. Sections should connect with and support Membership growth at their local student Branch. Make sure they sign up for an IEEE email alias.

4. Develop new Members through Society conferences, seminars and publications. If you have a IEEE branded conference in your area, please contact them and provide Membership support. After the conference, make sure that the list of prospective Members is organized and forwarded to headquarters, (q.harder@ieee.org).

5. Integrate Membership and Industry Relations efforts. Encourage local companies to support Membership. Recognize these companies during your meetings and through your Public Relations efforts. At the national level, we are developing a new Industry Relations program. I will have more information in early 2007.

6. Provide incentives for Sections that grow their Membership. More information on 2007 MD incentives will be available shortly. These incentives will come from IEEE, IEEE-USA and especially Region 3.

7. Start building the 2007 MD program now. Please don't wait until February or March to begin your MD campaign. The 2007 Membership Development Manual is attached. Follow the schedule that is contained in the manual. Right now you should be promoting renewals and selecting your 2007 MD team.

Bottom line, we have basically stopped the drop in Region 3 Membership during 2006. Let's set a goal of 5% or more growth during 2007. Let me know how I can help you.

Region 3 Professional Activities

By now, I hope all sections have appointed their respective Professional Activities chairs. Congratulations and thank you to all who volunteered to serve the professional needs of our members. As your Region 3 Professional Activities Coordinator, I welcome your suggestions and most importantly your ideas for professional activity projects in your sections. We, in Region 3, have proudly proclaimed the following:

"The member is IEEE and IEEE is the member."

This is a powerful statement, and our volunteer efforts in serving out members should focus on making it relevant. Since you know your local membership needs best, I have the privilege and duty to support you in this endeavor. We have twelve months working together to put on Professional Activities Seminars, work with teachers and school systems in pre-college education, get more active in state government activities. Government laws and regulations are becoming more impacting on our profession and our jobs. Our members deserve to have their voices heard and their needs met, and we are in the best seat of the house to fulfill their needs.

I encourage you to plan at least one Professional Activity (project) for your section in the spring and another one in the fall. Please let me know your plans, so I can support you financially and through other means. I have a budget for Region 3 Professional Activities. It is earmarked for funding section professional activities at your section. All I ask of you is submit a financial form. A copy of the financial form may be found at http://www.ieeeusa.org/volunteers/pace/funding.asp. It is very simple. On the financial form, you explain to me what your project entails, the benefit to your section members, project expenses, and potential sources of revenue. If approved, I will be glad to fund all or part of your expenses, depending on the size of the project. Please do not let project funding stand in the way of serving our members at your section.

This year, the Annual Workshop (Leadership Workshop) is being held in Phoenix, AZ, Labor Day weekend. It is a good time of the year, and I encourage you to plan to attend this workshop. As soon as the amount of funding becomes available to me, I will let you know how much I can support you. Usually, we have a good turnout from Region 3. The conference is information-packed, and the speakers are very resourceful. Most of all, it is a great opportunity for you to network with other volunteers and get to know who is doing what in IEEE. You get a chance to speak with and educate IEEE and IEEE-USA candidates for office, as to the issues at your locality.

Check us out at the Region 3 Web site, virtual communities, and IEEE-USA. You'll be glad you did. If your time and schedule allows you, I invite you to register at the most memorable IEEE Region 3 SoutheastCon 2007, at the downtown Marriott, in Richmond, VA, sponsored by Virginia council (Hampton Roads Section, Richmond Section, Central Virginia Section, and the robust Mountain section.) We have over 165 technical papers accepted out of 260 papers submitted. That plus tutorials and professional workshops that are technically challenging, professionally rewarding, and help you focus on specific skills that help you advance in your career. Virginia is celebrating the 400th anniversary of the first settlement at Jamestown, and Richmond is in the midst of all the festivities. Jamestown and colonial Williamsburg are within easy reach being about an hour away from Richmond.

I look forward to serving you and as you provide essential professional service to our members at your sections.
